She left shortly after three o'clock this afternoon for Sydney and St. John's, Nfld., with 50 head of cattle and 11 sheep, shipped by Blake Bros. for the Newfoundland market. She had one passenger, Thomas Thorne, from this port.

STRUCK BY LIGHTNING.—Holyoke, Mass., was visited by a terrible thunder storm on Monday last, which resulted fatal in at least one instance. A Mrs. Anne Quirk, of Elmwood, aged 60, stayed in her house alone until the storm was nearly over, when she coming alarmed she went to a neighbor's named Ash. Arriving there she seated herself in a chair directly under a large pin cushion which hung on the wall. In a few moments there came a flash of lightning, which entered the pin cushion, and then passed into the body of Mrs Quirk, killing her instantly.

MILITARY FUNERAL.—The body of the late Gunner Carpenter, No. 1 Battery, G. A., was laid to rest in St. Peter's Cemetery yesterday afternoon. The funeral was conducted with full military honors. The casket, wrapped in the Union Jack and ornamented with wreaths of flowers amidst which were placed the helmet and side arms of the deceased, was carried on a gun carriage, preceded by a firing party from No. 1 Battery and the Artillery Band, and followed by the mourners, and members of the two Batteries of Artillery, Charlottetown Engineer Corps, and No. 3 Co., 82nd Battalion. The services in St. Peter's Church, were conducted by Rev. James Simpson, and at the grave by Rev. T. H. Hunt.

The Samoan Conference.

LONDON, June 15.

The Berlin correspondent of the Times says in regard to the Samoan Commission although the strictest secrecy with regard to their decisions is observed, there can be no doubt that the Americans have emerged from this conference with flying colors, and that Germany has had to content herself with the prospect of much less political prominence on the Island than she claimed at Washington two years ago. This result, it would appear, is much more due to the firm and inextinguishable attitude of Blaine than to any political leaning of England towards the power which is her highest aim to conciliate. All the London papers comment editorially upon the treaty. The Daily News says it is believed that Phelps, who leaves to-night for New York, will be appointed American ambassador to Berlin.

Found in a Halibut.

HALIFAX, June 16.

Yesterday morning there arrived in the harbor the fishing schooner Hattie D. from the banks, commanded by Robert P. Isenham. Being short of drinking water and provisions the captain was obliged to run into port to replenish his supplies. On Tuesday evening, while the vessel was lying on the fishing banks, one of the men named Wm. Robertson hooked a halibut. The fish was of such large proportions that it took several of the crew to haul it on board. Upon opening the halibut a portion of a woman's hand, with the thumb and first and second finger, were found. On the second finger was a plain gold-band ring, on which were engraved the letters G. W. G. The ring was secured, and is now in Capt. Isenham's possession.

Presbytery Meeting.

TORONTO, July 15.

There was only a morning session of the Presbytery Assembly yesterday. The main business was the passing of reports from the various Presbyterian Colleges of the Dominion. As said by the Moderator at the close, they were of a very gratifying character. After a deputation was appointed to confer with the Women's Christian Temperance Union, and express sympathy with the Union and its work. It was decided to receive a deputation from the Toronto Conference of the Methodist Church on Wednesday.

The Duty on Beef and Apples.

OTTAWA, June 15.

Mr. Mills, M. P. for Annapolis has presented to the Minister of Finance a number of urgent and numerous signed petitions from his constituents in Annapolis praying for an increase in the import duty on beef, and also for a protective duty on apples. Among the signers who are urging increased protection are a large number of influential electors who have hitherto actively supported the free trade movement.

Appointed Chancellor.

MONTREAL, June 16.

Sir Donald Smith has been appointed Chancellor of McGill University, instead of Hon. Senator Ferrier, who died a year ago. A gift is announced of \$40,000 by Mr. Frothingham and Mrs. Molson.

Big Blaze.

MONTREAL, June 16.

The oil refinery was burned here to-night, and some freight cars standing near the oil ran over an area of 15 acres, and the whole grounds was one blazing mass. The loss is \$25,000.

Thomas Tierney, an employe of ice-man O'Sullivan, is the latest suspect in the Cronin mystery, and is under arrest. He is a member of the Clan-na-Gael.
