



# Local Production Chosen For Dominion Drama Finals

The Little Theatre Guild production of "Angel Street" has been selected by the Dominion Drama Festival as one of the best eight plays to be produced in Canada this year, and has accordingly been invited to compete in the Dominion Finals in Sherbrooke, Quebec, next month, for Dominion Championship.

"Angel Street" is a thrilling suspense play by Patrick Hamilton, and when competing in the Regional Festival for this Province in February will be up with all trophies. Mrs. Rebe Scantlebury, as director, received the Calvert Trophy with its accompanying cash award of one hundred dollars, and the DeBlais Trophy. Miss Mary

Moran, as the tragic Bella, received the Holman Trophy for best actress in the Festival, and Mr. H. Barry Bugden was awarded the Holman Trophy for best actor for his portrayal of Police Inspector Rough.

Others in the cast are Thomas Hunter, as the sinister Jack Manningham, who is endeavouring to drive his wife out of her mind; Jean Giddings as the sympathetic housekeeper, Elizabeth; Jennie Boomhoving as the brash maid, Nancy; and Jack Boomhoving and Jack MacKinnon as the two policemen. Miss Betty Hill is Stage Manager.

The performance given in February was very highly praised by adjudicator Miss Pamela Sterling,

English actress and producer, who had no criticism of the production as a whole, and very little of the individual performers.

Members of the cast were informed yesterday that they were invited to compete in the Finals, for the many trophies offered, including the top Calvert award with its cash prize of one thousand dollars.

It is hoped the production will be staged in Charlottetown before the cast leaves for Sherbrooke, giving everyone an opportunity to see this outstanding cast at work, and also giving them much needed financial and moral support as they go to represent this Province in competition with the best the Dominion has to offer.

# Polio Immunization Clinics In Charlottetown This Week

Plans are now completed to commence the polio immunization of the Charlottetown preschool children born before 1955 and expectant mothers on Tuesday and Wednesday of this week. The Health Department estimates there will be well over a thousand children attending the clinics which are to be held in the Baptist Church at Prince and Fitzroy Streets. These will be the largest immunization clinics ever held in the province and several teams of doctors and nurses will be constantly giving the inoculations so the parents and children may move through the clinic as quickly as possible.

When parents arrive with their children they will be required to register each child's name and form. The parents and children will sign a request for inoculation which will include the two inoculations to be given this spring as well as a third one later on. It will be a great help to the workers at the registration desk and save time if parents have the correct change ready. Each parent will be given a number on arrival and the children will be taken in turn.

The clinics at the Baptist Church this week are only for residents of Charlottetown. Other clinics will be held for the Spring Park and Parkdale areas shortly. A clinic will be held in Summerside this week also, but it, too, is only for the Summerside pre-school children and expectant mothers.

As soon as more vaccine arrives from the Connaught Laboratories the school children of Charlottetown and Summerside will be given their inoculations. Next month rural regional clinics will be held in 80 centres throughout the province which will give all those who are eligible an opportunity of receiving polio vaccine. The clinics are scheduled and advertised will be the only ones at which polio inoculations will be given this spring by the Health Department.

### RETIREMENT

Two years ago Sir Ernest retired from the Conservatory, and this spring he retires from the podium of the Symphony. He is to be honoured this month by the CBS, the Toronto Symphony, and the Mendelssohn Choir, who are planning a gala stage, radio and television performance to commemorate his long and distinguished service to Canada.

Sir Ernest follows a succession of eminent speakers, who have given the annual lecture, which was established in 1950 in the memory of Dr. S. N. Robertson who became Principal of Prince of Wales College in 1901 at the age of thirty and died after a long and distinguished career in 1937. The other lecturers were Dr. A. E. Kerr, President of Dalhousie, (1950); Monsigneur Ferdinand Vandry, Rector of Laval, (1951); Dr. Watson Kirkconnell, President of Acadia, (1952); Dr. Thomas H. Raddall, eminent Canadian novelist, (1953); Dr. R. C. Waller, internationally known Canadian educationist and retired Principal of Queens, (1954); and Dr. Charlotte Whitton, Mayor of Ottawa, (1955).

The Robertson Lecture is published each spring in the Dalhousie Review, which also reproduces it in pamphlet form for wide distribution among schools, colleges and libraries throughout Canada.

## Teachers' Resolution Re Royal Commission

Following the request of the Prince Edward Island Teachers' Federation in Convention at Easter, 1955, that the Board of Governors prepare a brief asking that the P. E. I. Government set up a Royal Commission to investigate the educational problems in our province, this brief was presented to the Government last November. Further to this the following resolution was passed unanimously by the assembly of teachers on Thursday last, at the closing session of the annual convention of the Prince Edward Island Teachers' Federation.

"Whereas the Board of Governors, acting on instructions from the members assembled in Convention at Easter, 1955, considered the advisability of requesting the Provincial Government to set up a Royal Commission to study the

problems in education in this province and petitioned the Government to take such action, therefore be it resolved:

"That the members of the P.E. I.T.F. assembled at this 1956 Convention approve of the action taken by the Board of Governors in this regard and urge that such steps, as may be necessary, be taken to win the support of members of the legislature for the establishment of a Commission;

"Be it further resolved that the Federation, at both the provincial and local levels shall undertake to provide information and disseminate knowledge with respect to the benefits to be derived from a study by a Royal Commission, and shall make every effort through various provincial organizations to create public opinion favourable to the establishment of a Commission.
