

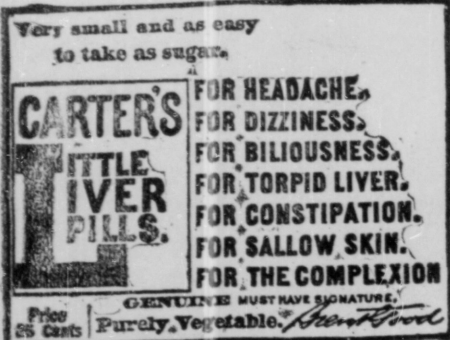

Sir Louis Davies and the Secrecy of the Ballot.

This section of the Dominion Election Act was in the bill as it was introduced by the Government of which Sir Louis is a member; and the Patriot declares that it "practically destroys the secrecy of the ballot."

"In the Province of Prince Edward Island, if any person desires to vote, whose right to vote is objected to on the ground of want of qualification, and if a candidate or (in the absence of such agent) any elector acting in the interest of a candidate, so objects in the presence of the elector, the deputy returning officer in addition to placing his initials on the back of the ballot paper, as provided by section 70, shall also place on the back thereof a number corresponding to that placed opposite the voter's name on the poll book.

Here are sub-sections 5 and 8 of section 96, safeguarding the secrecy of the ballot, with Sir Louis Davies' attempted amendment in italics:—

Sub section 5. No candidate, officer, clerk, agent or any other person shall communicate at any time to any person any information as to the number on the back of the ballot paper given to any voter at a polling station, except to a court or judge lawfully requiring him so to do or attempt to ascertain at the counting of votes the number on the back of any ballot paper; *but this provision shall not apply to ballots marked in accordance with sections 67 and 74 of this Act.*

Sub sec. 8. Everyone who violates any of the provisions of this section shall be guilty of an indictable offence, and liable to a penalty not exceeding two hundred dollars, and to imprisonment for any term not exceeding six months, with or without hard labor, in default of payment of such penalty.

SIR CHARLES AND THE FARMERS

SIR CHARLES TUPPER shows—in his long, but otherwise admirable letter, to our readers—that fruit is carried from the distant colonies of Australia, over seven thousand miles across the equator through the hottest latitudes, and is placed on the British market in prime condition while Canadian fruit arrives in Britain in an utterly unsaleable condition, although the ocean voyage from Canada to the United Kingdom is short and cool. He shows that while Canadian fruit is rotting in the orchards for want of a market, the exports of fruit to England have decreased since 1896. He shows how the New Zealand colonies and Australia have built up an immense business in exporting meats to the British market by a good system of mechanical cold storage transportation. He shows that in the Australian trade there are no less than 114 steamships fitted with mechanical refrigeration and having a carrying capacity of 7,342 150 carcasses of mutton, and that two vessels engaged in the Australasian trade have more cold storage capacity than the whole Canadian fleet. Sir Charles proposes to "give the farmers of Canada an equal chance with those of Australia—if only the electors will let him do so.

ANOTHER BREACH OF PRINCIPLE.

ONE of the great Liberal principles declared that no member of Parliament should accept an office from the Government. Mr. Mulock introduced a bill some years ago to carry this principle into operation. He said:

"If the government of the day can dangle public affairs before their followers, and induce a few, and perhaps an increasing number, to aspire to these positions instead of representing their constituents here, and exercising an unbiased judgment and a wholesome influence upon the Administration of the day, they become mere parasites upon the Administration, and cease to voice the opinion of their constituents. Not only do they do that, but, moving about among their colleagues, they become, as it were, corrupting agencies within their own ranks. So it has become, in my opinion, a crying evil, and Parliament is cast down from its high position."

Immediately after taking office Laurier wrote to Mr. Francois Langelier, a member of Parliament, in these words:

"This is what I propose: The position of lieutenant governor will be at our disposal at the end of 1897, and it from now till that time you are not appointed judge, I promise to place the lieutenant governorship at your disposal."

For two sessions Mr. Langelier sat and voted with this proposition from the Government in his pocket.

During the Conservative regime of eighteen years, seventeen members of Parliament received appointments.

NOTES AND COMMENTS.

—Heavy storms have destroyed the grape crops in many districts of Fran ce.

—We are to have a colder storage than has been—Hamilton Spectator. And it will be brought about with fast transportation.—Ottawa Citizen.

—In the course of its comments on a recent sad case, the Hamilton Times makes a remark that is of general application: "Girls should be more careful in choosing their company: she who makes herself cheap will be estimated cheaply."

—Since the English officers were sent to Chicago in August, 1899, to purchase supplies, 15,000 horses and 42,000 mules have been shipped thence to Cape Town, as well as large quantities of forage and other supplies, the pay therefor being about \$100 0,000 in English gold.

—The late Premier Marchand, of Quebec, was one of the Old Liberals. In his last letter to his constituents he says: "I never understood that the pledge given to a community was less binding on conscience and honor than a promise made to a private individual!"

—The Montreal Gazette remarks that "It is not on record that any leading liquor dealer ever threatened to vote against the Laurier Government because Prohibitionist Sydney Fisher was a member of it. Those in the trade distinguished between a prohibitionist for votes and a man who keeps his word."

—It appears that the same unmanly and illiberal game of trying to scare timid electors is being played in Ontario; for the Mail and Empire rises to explain that in the coming election "the vote will be absolutely secret. The government cannot trace your vote, and is unable to punish you in your business for voting against it."

—The Manitoba Free Press is hugging the delusion that Sir Wilfrid Laurier is the Liberal leader. Doesn't it know, what is apparent to the observer, that Laurier is only nominal leader; Tarte is the master mind. Sir Wilfrid has said as much; he has declared that "When Tarte goes, I go," which freely translated means I follow, or in other words, that Tarte leads.—Tarte is the Liberal leader.—Ottawa Citizen.

—The St. John Sun remarks that Professor Russell, M. P. for Halifax, has served his party too well rather than too ill. He is, however, to be set aside in favor of Mr. Roche, who is a man of less ability. Mr. Russell is man of limited means. Mr. Roche is reputed to be the richest man in Halifax. Mr. Tarte seems to have imbued his Halifax supporters with the doctrine that "elections are not made with prayers."

—A magazine has been started to promote the physical interests of the American baby. It is addressed, of course, to the mother of the baby, and it gives her a lot of information calculated to enable her to so raise it that it will grow into a splendid man or woman. "The Nursery" is the name of the publication. It is issued by the Van Publishing Company, of No 254 West Fifty fourth street, New York, at ten cents a copy, or \$1 a year, and is well illustrated and well printed. A very sedate looking stork is the appropriate picture on the cover.

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5785. and the percentage of increase in value of American exports during the same period has been 57.99, whereas during the preceding eighteen years the percentage of increase in value of exports from Canada was 52.55, compared with an increase of only 27.10 in the value of exports from the United States. In other words, the export trade of Canada developed nearly twice as fast proportionately as that of the United States during the 18 years of Conservative rule, but since the Liberals came into power the percentage of gain has been actually less than that of the United States. Under Conservative rule Canada kept up with its big neighbor. Under the Laurier-Tarte regime it has fallen back."
