NEW YORK (AP) - The stock market resumed its downward trend Monday with buying interest too light to counteract long-term profit-taking and speculation.

Volume fell off to 4,340,000 shares from 4,540,000 Friday and 4,560,000 Thursday. Dec. 3 when 4,270,000 shares changed hands.

Gold's rally against the dollar. The Dow Jones average declined 3 1/2 to 850 1/4. The Associated Press average took a loss of 1.1 at 321.2.

General American stocks showed a downward trend with a gain of 1/4. Chrysler lost 1/4. Ford, American and Studebaker 1/4 each.

Consolidated continued to offer the spotlight, making a new high at 52 1/2. American International, 194,900 shares, making it the most active stock.

Composite dropped 0.4 on to 153.3 as declines outbalanced advances 0.5.

Banks off 0.1 at 132.3. Royal plunged 7/8. Bank of Montreal 7/8. National 3/4 to 74 1/4 and Montreal and Toronto-Dominion 1/4 to 32.9.

Papers lost 0.4 to 33.8. Fraser dropped 1/4 to 32 and MacMillan, 2 1/4 to 42 1/4. Great Lakes added 1/4 to 157 1/4.

Industrials lost 0.4 at 157 1/4. Scheuch declined 1/4 to 22 1/4. Rothman's declined 1/4. Moore Co. gained 1/4 to 58 1/4.

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Three Arrested After Blast Near North Baptist Church

MONTGOMERY, Ala. (AP) - An explosive device rigged to a truck went off outside the North First Baptist Church here Sunday.

A policeman who saw the incident arrested three men who were later charged with setting off explosives in or near an unhabited building. The maximum penalty is death in the electric chair.

No one was injured in the explosion. The church escaped damage. It was one of four Negro churches dynamited in Montgomery in 1957. One of the three arrested Sunday was among four who were indicted for the church bombings last seven years ago.

Police Chief Marvin Stanley said the explosion was caused by gas-filled plastic balloons attached to the truck, packed in front of the church.

A spark plug was rigged to the pipe and a wire from the spark plug inside the cab of the truck started the gas in the plastic balloons exploded.

Stanley said it caused a tremendous noise. Police found the truck. Another wire ran from the truck battery inside the cab and, when the bare ends of the two wires touched, the gas in the plastic balloons exploded.

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Stanley said "apparently the men were attempting to terrorize" the Negroes.

The three were Henry Alexander, 35; James White, 31, and Donald Sanders, 19, all of Montgomery.
