Pilots of the visiting aircraft were handicapped in their maneuvers by low hanging clouds but the people gathered for the occasion were kept well informed through a public address system as to the role played by each aircraft as it flew over the field.

A Canso flying boat in a jet assisted take-off, and a ground rescue mission by a Royal Canadian Navy helicopter were two events that were the cause of great interest by the spectators. Almost every type of craft in use in the Atlantic Provinces took part, including Dakotas, Lancasters, Otters and Sea Furies, as well as an aerobatic team from the Moncton Flying Club.

A precision drill squad composed of air cadets from Summerside and Charlottetown under the command of W/O Jack Hobbs of Charlottetown went through some very intricate foot drill without an order from the squad commander and demonstrated a finesse which would do credit to a more mature company.

A musical treat was given visitors to the show by the Central Command Band of the Royal Canadian Air Force which is classed as one of the finest military bands in Canada.

A most interesting ground display in "A" hangar of Maritime Central Airways attracted thousands of visitors, courteously dealt with by air force personnel who explained the technical aspects of the work entailed in keeping the planes in the air. A static display of aircraft was the source of keen interest.

The preparation for the mammoth show was carried out by with nine Yak-18 planes piloted by women. Then seven big bombers with swept-back wings, each powered by four turbo-prop engines, roared across the field.

Fifty new twin-jet fighters screamed across the field at 500 feet. They were followed by 47 new single-jet fighters, apparently the successor to the MIG-17 and believed equivalent to the American Super Sabre F-100 or the French Mystere.

One qualified observer said these planes have "much more sweep back" than the MIG-17 and may be capable of faster-than-sound speed in level flight.

## Sydney Woman Improving After Heart Operation

PHILADELPHIA (AP) — Mrs. Bessie Legge, 23-year-old wife of an unemployed steelworker, whose Sydney, N.S., neighbors raised money to send her here for a delicate heart operation, is "continuing to improve," a Hahnemann hospital spokesman said Sunday.

The attractive young Canadian woman was operated on six days ago by a team of heart specialists in the hospital's famed Bailey Clinic, run by Dr. Charles P. Bailey. Dr. Bailey himself performed the operation in which surgery is performed directly on the heart of the patient to free conditions restricting normal blood flow.

Another Canadian visitor to the clinic, Michael Chiasson, 15, of New Waterford, N.S., has not yet undergone surgery, the spokesman said.

The red haired youngster, whose trip was financed by neighbors, is still undergoing tests, the spokesman explained, adding that Dr. Bailey may perform the operation sometime next week.

## Gives Views On Snowman

NEW DELHI (Reuters) — Dr. Charles Evans, leader of the successful British expedition to Mount Kanchenjunga in the Himalayas, said here Saturday that British experts had told him bristles from an "abominable snowman" might have come from a pig.

He said he thought some animal in the Himalayas was responsible for the mysterious tracks attributed to the "snowman", but said he couldn't give an opinion on whether it was two-legged or four-legged.

Evans said he had seen a "snowman" scalp at Thyangboche monastery at the foot of Mt. Everest. "It was about eight inches high and six inches thick and had red bristles. I took one of the bristles to the experts at the British museum in London and they thought they came from a pig," he said.

WATERLOO, Que. (CP) — One home and more than 2,000,000 board feet of softwood lumber were destroyed in a fire that swept through a lumber mill and threatened for a while to sweep down an entire street in this eastern townships community Thursday night. Three other homes were damaged.

Reports indicated as much as 2,500,000 board feet of lumber may have been lost. R. H. Robinson, president of Waterloo Plywood Ltd., said damage to company property alone was at least \$200,000.

Fire engines from Sherbrooke, Magog, Granby and Knowlton were called in to battle the blaze. It is believed to have started in piles of sawdust in the lumber yard. No one was reported injured.
