WHEREAS the General Assembly of this Island stands prorogued until Tuesday, the Sixth day of November inst:

I have thought fit, by and with the advice of Her Majesty's Executive Council, further to prorogue the said General Assembly, and the same is hereby prorogued until Thursday the Sixth day of December next, of which all persons concerned are required to take notice and govern themselves accordingly.

Given under my hand and the Great Seal of this Island; at Charlottetown, in the said Island, this 6th day of November, in the year of our Lord One thousand eight hundred and sixty six, and in the Thirtieth year of Her Majesty's reign.
