**"TRINITY HALL"**  
Passing finally to the chairman of the board of trustees, Rev. David Barwise accepted them in the name of the United Church of Canada "in token of the trust committed to us." At the conclusion of the ritual, which had been participated in by the attending congregation, Mr. Barwise stated: "By virtue of our sacred office we do now declare to the dedicated and officially opened this building to be known as Trinity Hall."

Insuing the call to worship and giving the invocation at the start of the proceedings, Rev. J. G. E. Ball, Trinity United Church minister, also acted as master of ceremonies for the occasion. The Scripture lesson was read by Rev. David Barwise and the prayer and Lord's Prayer were offered by Rev. G. G. Wyrwas. The appropriate solo "I Walked Today Where Jesus Walked" was sung by Mrs. Davis Cox, while at the conclusion of the ceremony of the keys, Edgar Wright sang "How Lovely Are Thy Dwellings". The accompanist for both was church organist J. B. Herdman.

The story of the planning for the Hall was told by Col. G. E. Full, chairman of the building committee, who paid tribute to Mr. Latimer and Brig. W. W. Reid for their great help. In this connection, the guest speaker said the Hall was built by a combination of the enthusiasm and impatience of youth, tempered by the caution and judgment of age, and designed for the training of, and giving leadership to, young people.

Among the non-clergy platform guests were Premier Walter R. Shaw and Mrs. Shaw, and Mayor Walter J. Cox and Mrs. Cox. The additional space made available for youth work by the Hall has made possible the setting aside in Heartz Hall of a large "Ladies' Parlor" where for the first time the various women's committees will have an area of privacy in which to conduct their meetings and discussions.

# 66,000 Volt Line Put Into Service

GEORGETOWN — A 66,000-volt transmission line built by Maritime Electric Co. Ltd. from

the Charlottetown generating plant to the Georgetown area was commissioned yesterday as the Georgetown substation transformer was installed and energized; the Summerville substation had alterations done and the cutting in of a new switch was carried out at Gills Forge on the 48 Road.

**HALIFAX (CP)** — The weather office says cold air swept across the Maritimes late Sunday as the storm which gave rain to all regions during the day moved north through Labrador.

Strong winds were to persist through the night in most regions. An area of high pressure approaching the district today will cause winds to subside gradually during daylight hours. It is expected to be mostly sunny today but daytime temperatures will generally be 15 to 20 degrees colder than Sunday.

**Regional forecasts:**  
Prince Edward Island: Mostly sunny today with westerly winds 20 with gusts to 45, diminishing this afternoon to westerly 15, much colder. Low-high at Charlottetown 25 and 32.

About 40 men were on the job yesterday from 10 a.m. to 5 p.m. and areas affected were from St. Peter's to Souris and East Point to Alberry Plains to Montague through to Wood Islands area, Dingwells Mills to Cardigan and Georgetown areas. With the completion of the new Georgetown substation the power necessary to take care of the growth load and to supply the Georgetown industries of Gulf Garden Foods Ltd., and Bathurst Marine Ltd. is now flowing through the transmission line to the industries.

To be known as number four transmission line and built at a cost of over \$350,000, the line is initially energized at 33,000 volts with a capacity of 5,000 kilowatts. The company has experienced a load growth over the past several years of 11 per cent annually as compared with the national average of eight per cent.

This factor combined with the influx of new industry in the eastern part of the province had made it necessary to provide the area with a loop system by means of which an alternate feed is available when required. For this purpose a \$15,000 switching station was built at Lorne Valley. A switching station at Brookwood provides the western end of the Island with a loop system.

**TWO STATIONS BUILT**  
In addition, two new substations were built at Georgetown and Scotchfort. The Georgetown station cost \$20,000 and is now in operation and the \$22,000 Scotchfort station is expected to be in operation soon.

Between 100 and 125 acres of woodland was cleared for construction of number four transmission line which was begun early last winter.

About half of the 33 1/2 mile line which involved placing 610 pole structures was built across country with the remainder following existing country roads.

Delta Electric Ltd. of Fredericton, N.B., received the \$47,000 contract for construction of the line. Actual work on the erection of the line began early in June.

Initially the line will have a capacity of 5,000 kilowatts which will be gradually increased to 12,000 kilowatts over the next 10 years as the use of electricity and load growth increase in the area.

Engineers in charge of construction for Maritime Electric were Eric Arsenault and George Hoffstra of Montreal Engineering Co. Ltd., consulting engineers.

**SAME PLAN SAVES CASH**

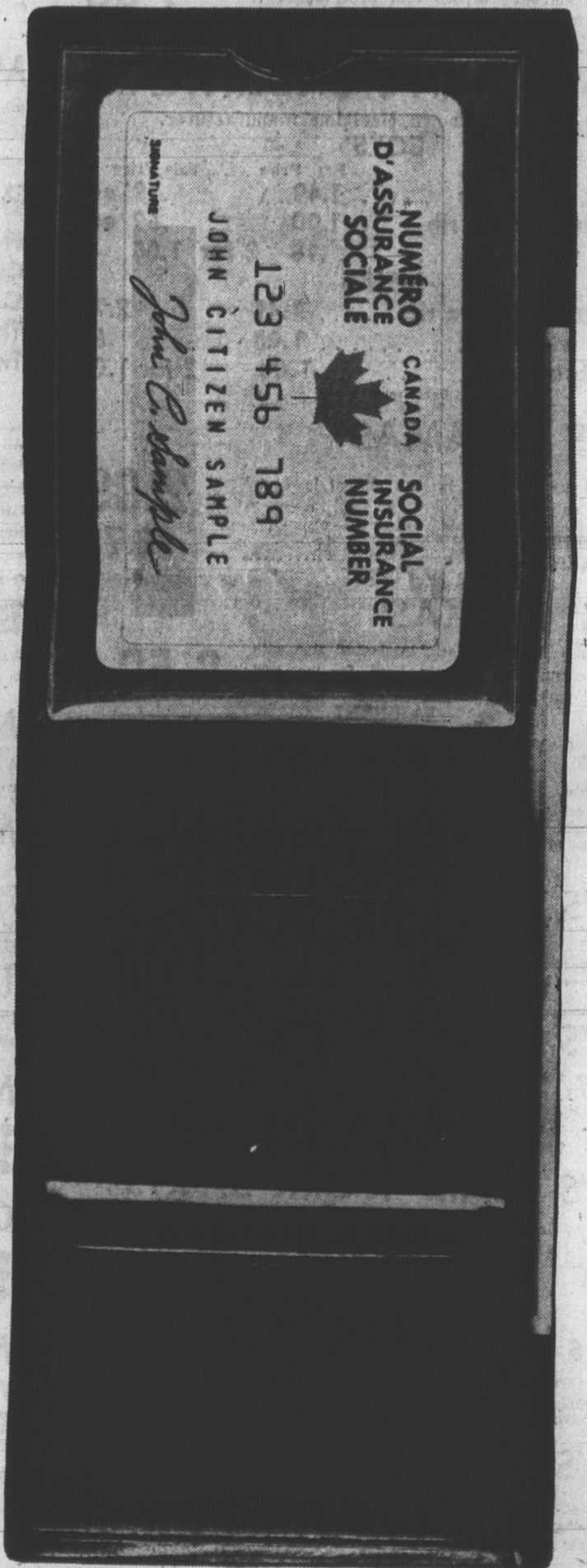
