

Liberal Leader Addresses Rally

Liberal Leader Alex Campbell and his two candidates, Daniel J. MacDonald and Bruce L. Stewart moved into the deferred election campaign in 1st Kings last night to tell a bumper meeting at Kingsboro Hall that the results of the election in the rest of the Island on May 30 constituted a clear-cut rejection of the Shaw government's plea for a vote of confidence in their fitness for continued office.

"They asked for endorsement of their industrial development policies," said Mr. Campbell, "but they failed miserably to get it. The best they could get was a deadlock in the voting with key ministers toppling in the process and the premier himself barely securing re-election against candidates completely new to politics."

"The rest of the province, the people who repudiated the desperate attempt of the weary Conservative government to hold onto power will be bitterly disappointed if the voters of this district do not swing with the trend," Mr. Campbell continued.

"Political destiny, indeed the economic and welfare destiny of this province now rests in your hands," he added, "and I am content to leave it there. Yours is the decision to make on July 11, not only for your own district but for all of Prince Edward Island."

"Give us the tools — your votes," pleaded veteran campaigner Daniel MacDonald, "and we most assuredly will finish the job so well started by Island voters on May 30. We cannot afford, nor should we be burdened by a calamitous continuation of too-little, too-late Conservative administration."

Expressing keen regret in the death of former candidate W.A. Acorn, whom he had the honor and responsibility to replace in this campaign, Bruce L. Stewart invited the voters of 1st Kings to "face the future confidently with the dynamic 12-point program offered by the Liberals."

It is the same program we this very vital election on July proposed in the beginning of the campaign," he said, "no last-minute promises, no attempted bribery. It was a program built by the people of all the Island, a grass-roots program democratically constructed for the good of all, every part of which we are prepared to implement if the related promises the Conservatives are now offering."

Committee Chairman Announces Feature

Well-known Canadian television and radio star, Tommy Common will be featured entertainer for the 1966 Gold Cup and Saucer parade and race on August 19. W.J. Hancock, assistant general chairman of the Gold Cup committee said yesterday.

The Gold Cup and Saucer Classic is an annual feature of the "Old Home Week" harness racing program. A mammoth parade is held on the morning of the day of the big race.

Mr. Common, who will be brought to Charlottetown through the courtesy of DuMaurier cigarettes, will be arriving in Charlottetown on Thursday, August 18. On Thursday evening, Mr. Common will be the guest of honor at a reception and next morning he will, take part in the Gold Cup and Saucer parade; in the afternoon Mr. Common will be visiting the patients at the Rehabilitation Centre and on Friday evening he will be performing between heats of the Gold Cup Classic at the Charlottetown Driving Park.

Another highlight of this year's parade will be the Estevan Collegiate Band from Estevan, Sask. This 55-member band will be taking part in the parade and in the afternoon will be giving a concert on the steps of the Confederation Centre.

The band, which features its own majorette corps, appeared last year at the Calgary Stampede and has also made several television appearances. The band master is Hugh F. Williams.

Eight other bands have been invited to take part in the "Gold Cup" festivities and many of these have already confirmed that they will be taking part. Three of these are from out of the province.

EXTENSIVE INVITATION Charlottetown's mayor, Walter J. Cox, has extended an invitation to Mayor Harry Nicholson of Estevan to visit Charlottetown along with the band. As in previous years the loveliest feature of the Gold Cup Parade and Race will be the appearance of the Gold Cup and Saucer girls.
