The marriage of Miss Mitchell, daughter of Senator Mitchell, of Oregon, to a French nobleman, the Duke de la Rochefoucauld, appears to be a union dictated by love on both sides, contracted after wise and careful deliberation, and without the motives of foolish ambition on the one hand and cupidity on the other that too of an attachable American girl, who fell in love with a manly fellow, and the latter happened to have a title. We regret to notice in the reports of the wedding that the Duke can trace his ancestry only as far back as somebody in the eleventh century, whereas most of us can trace back to Adam. But this brevity of pedigree on the part of Miss Mitchell's soldier husband can be pardoned in view of the fact that he is no doubt "a man for a' that."
