DEATH OF ONE OF THE OLDEST INHABITANTS.—Died at Scourie, on the 4th inst., after a long illness, Mrs. Paquet, relict of the late Private Paquet, in the 94th year of her age. Mrs. Paquet was one of the earliest settlers of Scourie. She lived a quiet, Christian life, beloved by her family, and respected by everyone who knew her. Her remains were interred in the grave on Tuesday last by a large concourse of people of various denominations. "Blessed are the pure in heart."

PERISHED AT SEA.—By a letter just received, we learn of the death of an Islander, which occurred at Fortune Bay, Newfoundland, under the following painful circumstances: "Michael Brien, brother of John Brien, of Naufrage, King's County, attempted one evening in January last to go in a dugger from his own vessel to one that was some distance off. The weather was extremely cold at the time, and shortly after he started a dense fog set in. Though near midnight, it was thought he might reach his destination in safety, but the fog fell it appears lost his way and perished from cold and exposure. Two days afterwards he was found about three miles from his vessel sitting upright in the bottom of his dugger, frozen stiff, with the oars still in his hands. He was unmarried, and is said to have been a very inoffensive and trustworthy man."

DOMINION PARLIAMENT.

Inter-Provincial Trade.

OTTAWA, March 8. Mr. Paint, on Monday, moved for a Select Committee to take into consideration a report as to how inter-Provincial trade may be best promoted, and the earnings and enlarged traffic of the Intercolonial Railway be further increased by products from Ontario and Quebec east to the Maritime Provinces and Newfoundland, by returning freight. The motion was passed yesterday, and the Committee was appointed. Mr. Paint is the chairman.

Private Bills, Questions, etc.

A number of private Bills were passed yesterday, and after a number of questions were answered, the House adjourned at 5 30 p. m.

Liquor Legislation.

Sir John Macdonald has given notice that, on Friday, he will move for the appointment of a Committee of seventeen members of the House of Commons, to consider the temperance paragraph in the Governor-General's Speech from the Throne, and decide what legislation is necessary.

[The paragraph is as follows:—"I am advised that the judgment of the Lords of the Judicial Committee of the Privy Council, delivered last June on the appeal of Russell vs. the Queen, goes to show that, in order to prevent the unrestrained sale of intoxicating liquors, and for that purpose to regulate the grant of shop, saloon and tavern licenses, legislation by the Dominion Parliament will be necessary. Your earnest consideration on this important subject is desired."]]

The annual meeting of the Dominion Rifle Association was held yesterday. It was decided to hold the annual shooting match on the 5th of September next.
