The alligator is rapidly disappearing in the settled regions of Florida and becoming scarce every day even in such remote regions as the Everglades, owing to the war of extermination waged against it by hide hunters, taxidermists and dealers in curiosities.

These do not eat any food for several days after leaving the nest and make a beginning on larvae, water insects and frogs, gradually advancing to snakes, fishes and finally to anything edible. They cannot eat food that requires tearing apart, owing to the bluntness and irregularity of their teeth.

The teeth are hollow, yet strong, and are shed every year, so that the loss of a few in a contest produces no permanent injury. Both old and young catch their prey by lying in wait for it and striking it suddenly with the tail when it approaches near enough to be hit.
