Moncton Training Camp To Open At Fredericton

MONCTON, N. B., Oct. 1-(CP)-A dozen players are expected to be on hand when Moncton Hawks open their training camp at Fredericton Friday, playing-coach Johnny Horeck announced tonight. That number is expected to be nearly doubled early next week. The coach of Moncton's entry in the Maritime Major Hockey League said two goal-keepers, three defencemen and six forwards were expected to make up the vanguard of the trainees.

Denis Brodeur, last season with Saint John Beavers, and Jackie Gibson of Saskatoon Quakers, will be trying for the goalkeeper's berth. On defence will be Bill Winemaster of Toronto, Dick Wolstenholme of Galt, Ont., and Eddie Marchant of Winnipeg. Forwards asked to report are Don Berry, formerly of Sydney Millionaires, Buck Whitlock of last season's Saint John Beavers, Joe Schmidt, with Halifax St. Mary's two seasons ago, Gordie Miller of last year's Hawks, Ray Marshall of Quebec City and Sam Kennedy of Brantford, Ont.
