LET'S EAT

Pineapple-Crab Salad Straight From Hawaii

"From now through June," I was saying, "fresh pineapples will be plentiful. They are ripe if the top centre leaves pull out easily."

"To prepare, set the pineapple upright on a vegetable board. Hold by the top to keep it steady, the slice off the rough skin. Remove sugar, cover and chill."

"For first course, breakfast or desert service, I first remove the skin. Then I slice the pineapple in rounds. Cut out the hard centre with a tiny biscuit cutter and dice or thin-slice the fruit. Add a very little sugar, cover and chill."

"Remember the pineapple-crab salad we enjoyed in Hawaii, Madame" remarked the Chef. "It was made with fresh pineapple, right from the grove."

"The tart refreshing flavor is a perfect combination with crab or lobster as well as in tuna or chicken salad."

"This remarkable blend of flavors can be achieved only by using fresh pineapple."

"Canned pineapple contains sugar. So when combined with meat, poultry or fish it must be in sweet-sour combinations such as sweet-and-pungent chicken or sweet-and-pungent chop suey or with smoked ham."

Hawaiian Pineapple Crab Salad: On a bed of lettuce, arrange flat bite-sized sections of chilled sliced fresh pineapple. Top with bite-sized pieces of canned or fresh-cooked crabmeat.

Cover with a dressing made by combining 1 c. tomato ketchup, 1-3 c. lemon juice and 2 tsp. cold water.

TOMORROW'S DINNER
Cream of Tomato Soup with Croutons
Broiled Ham Slices
Broiled Sweet Potatoes
Spinach Vinaigrette Salad
Rhubarb-Apple Crisp Pie or Prune Compote
Coffee Tea Milk

All measurements are level; recipes proportioned to serve 4-6.
Rhubarb-Apple-Crisp Pie: Line a 9" pie plate with pie pastry.

Mix 2-3 c. sugar with 1/4 tsp. salt and 1/4 tsp. each cinnamon and nutmeg. Spread over pastry.

Drain 1 1/2 c. canned apple slices. Add 1/2 c. small-diced unpeeled young rhubarb.

Blend 2 tbsps. cornstarch with the drained apple syrup. Cook - stir until thickened.

Gently mix in the rhubarb and apple slices. Spread in the lined pie plate.

Top with fruit pie topping. Bake 50 mins. in a moderately hot oven, 375 to 400 degrees F. Garnish with nutmeats if desired.

Fruit Pie Topping: Mix 1/4 c. not-liquid brown sugar, 2 tbsps. enriched flour, 1/4 c. melted butter or margarine and 1/4 tsp. salt.
