

Town Seeking Fire Fighters

GEORGETOWN — At a recent meeting of the Georgetown Town Council presided over by Mayor Howard S. MacLean, it was decided to have the town clerk post notices asking for volunteer fire fighters. Volunteers are to leave their names with the clerk.

The meeting observed two minutes silence in memory of the late Alister H. Stewart, who had served the town as mayor, deputy mayor and as a town councillor.

Correspondence was read relative to the Prince Edward Island United Fund and the United Fund Atlantic regional conference to be held in Charlottetown May 20 and 21. The council appointed Mrs. F.J. DeLory to represent the Georgetown at the session.

Correspondence was also read and arrangements made for the town to be represented at the annual meeting of the Federation of Mayors and Municipalities to be held in the Confederation Centre in Charlottetown May 5.

Received and approved by the council was one application from a party to build a new home and an application to build an addition on a home. Also received was an application from a party to install a septic tank.

It was decided to write to David Boswell regarding the 1965 physical fitness grant for the town.

A letter was read from Jens Moe, president of Gulf Garden Foods, inviting the mayor and council to meet with him to discuss matters relative to the

town and the local industries. The clerk was instructed to post notices to the effect that the fire fighting equipment and two men would be on stand-by duty on Wednesday, Thursday, Friday and Saturday to assist and protect properties while citizens burned grass on their properties and on vacant lots. Arrangements were made to have a bulldozer work on cleaning up the town dump. The council also spent some time on working on the proposed budgets for the various departments of the civic government.

Anglican Bishop Visits; Tells Diocesan Plans

The 121st annual meeting of the Diocesan Church Society took place in St. Paul's Parish Hall Thursday, with the president, Right Rev. W. W. Davis, bishop of the diocese, in the chair.

The meeting was well attended by clergy and laity. The bishop stated he would be present at the service commemorating the 75th anniversary opening of St. Luke's Church, O'Leary, on St. Luke's Day October 18. He also announced that during the summer months a divinity student would be in charge of Holy Trinity Church, Georgetown, and that other services will be provided by the clergy of the diocese.

The minutes of the last meeting were read and adopted, and the reports of the various Departments were accepted, as was the report of the Archdeacon covering the work of the Church on the Island during the past year. Rev. Louis Elias read a paper on Religious Education on University Campus, which was fully discussed and action taken.

Presbyterian Minister Here Awarded Divinity Doctorate

Two outstanding clergymen of the Presbyterian Church in Canada, Rev. Thomas Henry Bussell Somers, MA, STM, Charlottetown, and Rev. Arthur William Currie, MA, ThM, Ottawa, were honored with the degree of Doctor of Divinity by Knox College at convocation exercises held in Convocation

Hall, University of Toronto, April 27.

A total of 16 candidates received their Bachelor of Divinity degrees and three their degrees in Master of Theology.

The address to the graduates was delivered by the Rev. James D. Smart, MA, BD, PhD, DD, of Union Theological Seminary, New York City.

The degree to Dr. Somers was presented in absentia and the Rev. Dr. R. McKillican, dean of students, Knox College, was commissioned by the Faculty to present personally to Dr. Somers the parchment in connection with the honor bestowed on him by the college. Dr. Somers has been Minister of the Kirk of St. James, Charlottetown for 24 years. He was

inducted to the office in September, 1941. Dr. Somers has taken a prominent part in the religious life of the community and has given generous assistance in forwarding the work of welfare organizations.

Engineering Institute Pres. Will Visit Branch In City

It was recently announced that Col. George E. Humphries of Montreal, the president of the Engineering Institute of Canada, will visit the local engineering branch in Charlottetown on May 4.

Col. Humphries was born in Wolverhampton, England and received his early education there. He also attended technical college. He took job training in steam plant design and construction, worked as a structural draftsman and designer, as a prospector and surveyor for underground mine development and was engaged in design and construction of a mining and milling plant.

In 1940 he joined the Royal Canadian Engineers as Sapper. He served in England and North West Europe and did development work in advanced landing

grounds for close support aircraft and also developed heavy bridging techniques for crossing large rivers where floating equipment was not feasible. He was mentioned in despatches and awarded an MBE. In 1945 he was demobilized with rank of captain. He served in the active Militia until 1956, retiring to Supplementary Reserve with rank of Lieutenant Colonel.

He joined the Engineering Institute of Canada in 1930 and was elected president in May 1964.

Mr. Humphries is married and has two sons, 21 and 16. While in Charlottetown he will make official calls on Lieutenant Governor W. J. MacDonald, Premier Walter Shaw and Mayor Walter Cox. He will be tendered a reception and dinner at 6.30 p.m. on Tuesday, May 4 at the Charlottetown Hotel.

As much or more is expected today as returns from those who just beat the deadline start pouring in.

Despite the closing crush, Mr. Arbuckle said, everything's going well. The returns flood "is about what we expected."

ATTENTION POTATO GROWERS

The attention of all farmers is directed to an amendment of the Prince Edward Island Potato Production Act passed in 1962 whereby all persons planting one-quarter acre or more of potatoes must plant those of the "Certified" class or better unless written authority is received from the Minister of Agriculture. As there are still seed potatoes available, the planting of table stock is not warranted and no authority for the use of table stock will be granted except in cases where proof is submitted that seed cannot be procured.

Also be advised that any grower whose field or land has borne a crop of potatoes infected with any plant disease or pest shall not permit the same area to be planted to potatoes the following year except on the authority of an Inspector and shall destroy any volunteer plants on such land.

Areas so infected in 1964 will be policed to see that these regulations are strictly enforced.

As checks will be made of fields of potatoes this year, all growers must retain and have available for the Inspector their seed tags or the written authority from the Minister to plant seed of table stock origin.
