First Christian Drama Workshop Held At Halifax

The first Christian Drama Workshop to be held in eastern Canada was recently concluded at King's College, Halifax. The workshop, held from July 24 to 28 under the sponsorship of the Religious Drama Council of Canada, was a remarkable experience for the students and created a keen interest in all phases of the religious theatrical field. The instructors, supplied by the Council, were highly skilled and inspired those attending to carry forward the cause of Christian Drama in this section of Canada.

Mr. Leonard Crainford was the director of the workshop. He is the director of design for CBC-TV and holds the position of executive chairman of the Christian Drama Council of Canada. He has had wide experience in England and Central Canada as producer, director and adjudicator.

The Council, which was established two years ago in Toronto, is honored in having as patrons the presidents of the Canadian Council of Churches and the Baptist Federation of Canada, the Primate of the Church of England in Canada, the Moderators of the United Church of Canada and the Presbyterian Church. Other groups who have given approval to the Council are the Churches of Christ (Disciples), the Evangelical United Brethren, the British and Foreign Bible Society, The Salvation Army and the Students Christian movement. At present there is a membership of 500 and it is hoped that this will be greatly increased and regional bodies of the council will be set up to assist the central body to care for the needs of its members. At the present time the council serves its members with a lending library of reference and technical books and plays, advice to groups in selection and production of plays and the arranging of Drama Workshops such as the one in Halifax. 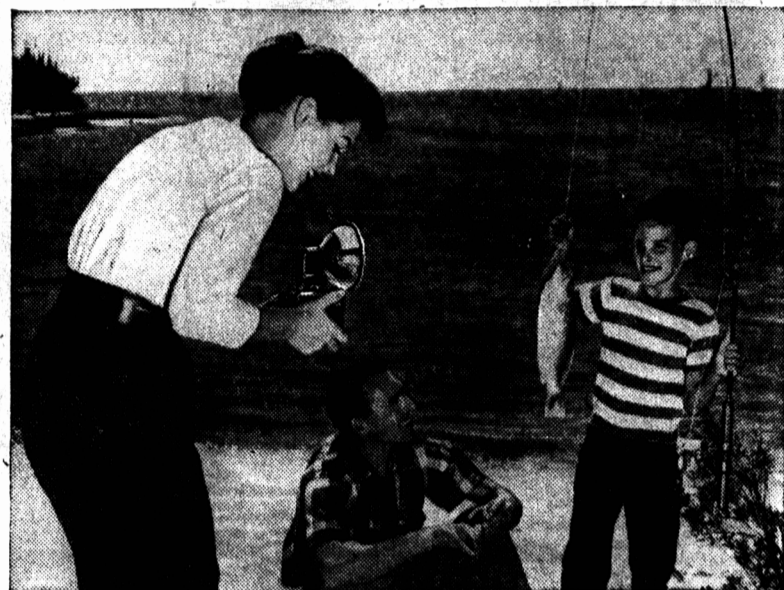
Mr. Crainford were Miss Marion Brillinger and Mr. Jack Medhurst. Miss Brillinger, director of the C. D.C., trained and experienced in religious drama in England, the United States and the Holy Land, instructed in drama in Christian Education, costume and drama with children. Mr. Medhurst, widely experienced in the professional theatre and CBC-TV, gave expert instruction in stage craft and acting technique. Mr. Crainford's courses were on approach to

Christian drama directing the play and lighting. Prof. Edward Roberts of King's College gave one session on voice and speech. The school was attended by clergy and lay people from Nova Scotia, New Brunswick and Prince Edward Island and at the conclusion of the Workshop a regional committee was set up for the Maritime to make plans for the future work of the council in this area. Mrs. Donald A. Sharpe of Souris is the representative for Prince Edward Island. Also attending the Workshop from Charlottetown was Mr. David MacDonald.

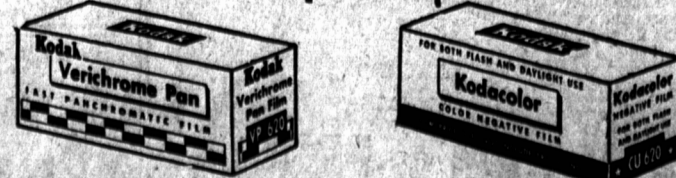

AGRICULTURAL NEWS

F. E. I. Department of Agriculture

The Provincial Exhibition and Old Home Week got under way on Monday last. The quantity and volume of the exhibits in all departments exemplified Prince Edward Island's agriculture in its broader senses.

When you come to the fair do not fail to visit the various barns with cattle, horses, swine, sheep, and poultry-houses. This will afford you an opportunity to judge for yourself the high quality which our Island's agriculture in its broader senses.

The division of horticulture is depicting the steps to be followed in more profitable strawberry production and information concerning the processing of the various horticultural crops.

WORLD CHAMPIONSHIP
The world's championship breeder won last year by Mr. F.A. McAulay of Souris is displayed in the Department of Agriculture booth. This is the first time that the coveted award has come to the Province. Through the kindness of Mr. McAulay, he has offered the display of this breed so that all may have opportunity to look at it.

VETERINARY SERVICE
During the Provincial Exhibition and Old Home Week the Veterinary office is located in the left of the Grand Stand at the exhibition grounds. This affords a twenty-four hour service to all livestock owners. If you have any inquiries in reference to veterinary service do not hesitate to drop in and have a chat.

OFFICIALS
Practically all the officials of the Production Service Livestock, Branch of the Canada Department of Agriculture and officials of the Provincial Department of Agriculture are working in the various divisions at the Provincial Exhibition, and they are only too anxious to discuss any problems with you.

Two important changes were recently effected in connection with the Animal Husbandry Department of MacDonald College. Alex R. Ness, was for many years appointed head of the department and Professor Hamilton was promoted to the head of the Department. It is of interest to note that Professor Hamilton is judging the sheep and swine this week at the Provincial Exhibition in Charlottetown.

DISTINGUISHED SERVICE
Alex R. Ness graduated as a member of the second class of MacDonald College, in 1912, and he had been a member of the Animal Husbandry Staff of that College (now a Faculty of McGill University), ever since then. That is except during his years of service in the Canadian Forces during World War I. However since he was on a "Leave of Absence" basis during the period of his military services, he has had forty-eight unbroken Association with MacDonald College.

He was Chief Assistant to Dr. C.H. Barton when the latter was Head of the Animal Husbandry Department of the College and Dean of Agriculture, McGill University. It therefore was that when Dr. Barton resigned to be-

come Deputy Minister of Agriculture for Canada, Alex Ness was appointed as his successor as Chief and then Chairman of the Animal Husbandry Department. During which time he attained an enviable reputation as an outstanding Professor of Animal Husbandry.

"ANOTHER MAN'S GAIN"
Unfortunately for the Ayrshire breed of cattle it would seem that they have lost an ardent worker and supporter. However, as the saying goes "What's one Man's loss is another man's gain." The Holstein-Friesian association of Canada immediately retained the services of Alex Ness as a Type Classification Inspector of that breed of cattle.

He is, of course, well qualified for that task because in addition to his knowledge of that breed as an Animal Husbandry Professor, also as a judge at several leading exhibitions, he built up the MacDonald College Holstein herd to quite a high standard of excellence—both as regards bloodline, conformation, production, and reproduction.

Incidentally that loss to the Ayrshire Association will be shared by the Canadian Jersey Cattle Club since Alex Ness also did considerable Type Classification work for that breed in the past.

BACKGROUND AND SERVICE
Ayrshire-wise, Alex Ness has a great background and a great record of service. He is the youngest son of the late Robert Ness of Howick, the last president of the Ayrshire Importers' and Breeders' Association of Canada, and the first president of Canadian Ayrshire Breeders' Association.

He was in active charge of the Ayrshire herd (and, of course the herds of other breeds) at MacDonald College for a great many years. During that time the Ayrshire herd at MacDonald College was built up to its present high standard.

He was one of the initial members of the Committee which formulated the Type Classification work for that breed in the past.

THE NEW CHIEF
Despite his initials, L. (Lionel) H., the new chairman of the Animal Husbandry department of MacDonald College, is mostly called "Jim" Hamilton that first name (or nickname) probably dates back to his School or College days.
Jim Hamilton has been a member of the staff of MacDonald College since 1920, and during the past several years he was Chief Assistant to Alex R. Ness in the Animal Husbandry Department. While he is, of course, well versed in dairy cattle, Dual Purpose Shorthorns, Sheep and Swine, in fact it might well be said that he is one of the leading authorities in connection with the three aforementioned classes of livestock. Also, as a matter of fact his services have been in keen demand as a judge of Sheep and Swine at leading exhibitions of Quebec. He has also acted as judge of Dual Purpose Shorthorns at several large exhibitions, including the Royal Winter Fair. Two years ago he was a member of the Panel of Judges which placed the Scotch Shorthorns at the Royal Winter Fair.
Along with his Animal Husbandry position, he also filled the position of Director of the Diploma Course in Agriculture. He is therefore well and favourably known

to a wide circle of people engaged in Agriculture, in general, livestock in particular.
