

# Chief Justice Decides In Truck Seizure At S'side

A special application to the Chief Justice Thane A. Campbell made by F.E. MacDonald Ltd., for recovery of a vehicle sold by the dealer to one Medick Perry and seized under an infraction of the Excise Act was heard before Monday and the application was refused.

The vehicle, a panel truck, had been sold by the dealer to Perry and a balance remained unpaid on the purchase price. According to the evidence the truck had been used by Perry for illegal purposes and had been confiscated according to the terms of the Excise Act and to be sold. The act requires that the dealer must make reasonable inquiries to satisfy himself that the vehicle would not be used for illegal purposes such as contravening the Excise Act.

The dealer, F. Earle MacDonald Ltd., failed to satisfy the court that he had made sufficient inquiries to satisfy the requirements of the act and the application was refused.

Mr. Morley M. Bell Q.C. appeared for the Minister of National Revenue and Mr. D.O. Stewart Q.C. appeared for the applicant.

The provisions of S. 164 are as follows: "(1) Whenever any horses, vehicles, vessels or other appliances have been seized as forefettered under this act, anyone (other than the person accused of an offence resulting in such seizure or person in whose possession such horses, vehicles or other appliances were seized) who claims an interest in such horses, vehicles, vessels or other appliances as owner, mortgagee, lien-holder or holder of any like interest within thirty days after such seizure apply to any judge of any superior court of any Province of Canada or to a judge of the Exchequer Court for an order declaring his interest.

(2) Where, after such notice to the Minister as the judge may require it is made to satisfy himself of the satisfaction of such judge: (A) That the claimant is innocent of any complicity in the offence resulting in such seizure or of any collusion with the offender in relation thereto; and (B) that he exercised all reasonable care in respect of the person permitted to obtain the possession of such horses, vehicles, vessels or other appliances to satisfy himself that they were not likely to be used contrary to the provisions of this act or, if a mortgagee or lienholder, that before becoming such mortgagee or lienholder he exercised such care with respect to the mortgagee or lienholder: he is entitled to an order that his interest be not affected by such seizure. S. 164, C. 52, S. 169A, 1948, C. 49, S. 33.

"It is admitted by the Crown, and abundantly clear from the evidence, that the applicant is innocent of any complicity or collusion, and that it has therefore complied with the requirement of subsection (2) (A) of S. 164.

"As for the evidence, the evidence is purely negative. The applicant knew of nothing which would lead it to suspect that the vehicle was likely to be used contrary to the provisions of the act, but it made no investigation on this point either before or after the contract of sale. An inquiry at the time of the contract would not have revealed any relevant facts. Perry was, however, apparently suspected by the police, who made several fruitless searches of his premises before the time of the

relevant seizure. Whether any of those searches preceded the date those searches preceded the date closed.

"Two lines of decision appeared in the cases cited.

"The applicant relies on Northwest Mortgage Co. v. Commissioner of Excise (1944) 81 C.C.C. 294, in which Dyar, J., held that "all reasonable care" did not necessarily involve a clearance from the police that the mortgagee is not likely to lapse into breach of penal laws, but might fairly be confined to the care regarded as reasonably necessary by a business man in a business transaction.

"Dyart, J., thought it was going too far to interpret "all reasonable care" as meaning "all possible care" or "all conceivable care."

"Teller, J., in Tilden Drive Yourself Co. v. Deputy Minister of National Revenue, (1952) 103 C.C.C. C. P. 280 says: "the court is not ready to accept as a principle that in all cases of this nature extensive investigations under police authority, eliminating any possibility of error, must be undertaken, if, for such were the case, it is evident that a person of good faith would never be able to assert his interest."

"In the line of decisions cited by the Crown, which held that some definite action, excluding any negative attitude or abstention, is imposed on an applicant, each case indicates that some cause for suspicion would have been disclosed by the inquiry which the applicant had failed to make.

"In the Tilden case, supra, there were "facts sufficient to arouse somewhat of the suspicions of claimant's employees."

"There was a record of previous offences in Traders Finance Corp. Ltd. v. The King (1941) 102 C.C.C. P. 40, per Lalonde J. ALSO IN P. General Motors Acceptance Corp. v. Commissioner of Excise (1942) 77 C.C.C. 244, per Chisholm C. J. also in re Traders Finance Corp. v. Commissioner of Excise, (1940) 75 C.C.C. P. 109, per Harrison, J. also in re Commercial Credit Corporation of Canada Ltd. (1941) 77 C.C.C. P. 363, per Urquhart, J. there were suspicious circumstances, including a motor accident, in Colonial Finance Corp. v. Commissioner of Excise, (1941) 75 C.C.C. P. 276, per Green, J.

"In the present case, as counsel for the applicant points out, inquiries at the time of the contract and delivery of possession would have revealed no relevant convictions against Perry, and perhaps no facts which would have aroused suspicion. I think, however, that this subjective test is not sufficient to exonerate the applicant from taking of reasonable precautions. If it were then the sole question would be whether, or not, there was evidence available such as to the provisions of the act. If such evidence were available an application of this kind would fail, and if such evidence were not available the application would succeed irrespective of the presence or absence of reasonable care on the part of the applicant.

"It seems clear that the expression "exercised all reasonable care" imposes the burden of at least some positive action on a potential applicant, and implies at least a partially subjective test of the reasonable sufficiency of the care exercised.

"Even if there was a factual absence of likelihood of the vehicle would be used contrary to the provisions of the act, the applicant must show that it affirmatively "satisfied" itself on this point. This applicant displayed what Teller, J., in the Tilden case, supra, characterized as a purely negative attitude or abstention. "It did not even make inquiries of the two persons who the purchaser named as "references" at the time of the contract.

"I regretfully conclude that this applicant has not discharged the burden of exercising "all reasonable care."

"The applicant is therefore refused, and (unless the Minister waives payment of costs) the applicant is ordered to pay the respondent's costs of this application."
