

Pitchers Lead Orioles In Four Game Series Sweep

BALTIMORE (AP) — Dave McNally completed a stunning four-game World Series sweep by Baltimore's raggedly pitching staff Sunday, with a 1-0 victory over the Los Angeles Dodgers on Frank Robinson's towering home run.

The shutout stretched the Dodgers' record streak of scoreless innings to 33.

Robinson, a refugee from the National League whose trade to Cincinnati last winter was to rank with the prize winners of baseball, topped his triple crown year by hitting a Don Drysdale pitch deep into the left field seats, a 410-foot blast in the fourth inning.

McNally, following the pattern of Moe Drabowsky, Jim Palmer and Wally Bunker, put the Dodgers in the books as the champs of a new sort of futurity.

The National League champ-

ions didn't score a run from the third inning of the opener through the rest of the Series. The former Series record of 28 was set by the old New York Giants against the Philadelphia As back in the gaslight era of 1905.

FIRST SINCE YANKS

Hank Bauer's champs became the first American League team to sweep a Series since the 1950 New York Yankees won four straight from the Phillies.

The roaring crowd of 54,458, which helped push the player pool to a record \$1,044,042.65, watched the Orioles win their first World Series on a beautiful afternoon.

It was the first major league championship for Baltimore since the days of Ned Hanlon's old Orioles of the National League in 1894, 1895 and 1896.

The Dodgers took it right down to the wire before suffer-

ing for their first four straight defeats in Series play.

With one out in the ninth, pinch-hitter Al Ferrara singled to left centre, and Nate Oliver, a speedster, went in to run for him. Maury Wills drew a walk on a 3-1 pitch and the temperature at Municipal Stadium reached the boiling point.

While Davis, the goat of the second game when he made three errors in one inning, left a high drive to right field that Frank Robinson took for the second out.

With everybody in the park on their feet, Harry Brecheen, the pitching coach, went out to the mound to talk to the 23-year-old left-hander.

Lou Johnson, a dangerous right-handed batter, was up. But McNally got Johnson to swing and miss at two pitches. Then he lifted an easy fly to Paul Blair, the slight centre-fielder who won Saturday's game with his homer.

The last out touched off a celebration that would be swinging through the downtown Baltimore streets far into the early hours of Monday morning.

Sharp fielding by the Orioles, who did not make an error in this sweep of a Series they were supposed to lose, helped McNally along the way. After each of the first three of the four Dodger hits, the Orioles came up with a double play.

There were two spectacular fielding plays, one by each side. Willie Davis leaped high above the seven-foot wire fence in centre field to drag down Boog Powell's towering smash in the fourth to prevent another homer.

Bauer made a defensive move in the eighth that paid off immediately. He sent Russ Snyder to left field, and moved Blair into centre to protect that 1-0 lead.

The first man up in the Dodgers eighth, Jim Lefebvre, drove a McNally pitch to deep left centre, but Blair was waiting, ready for a saving leap in front of the same seven-foot barrier.

ONLY TWO RUNS

The Dodgers had only 17 hits in the entire Series and scored but two runs. One of the runs was a homer by Lefebvre, and the other was forced home by a base on balls with the bases full.

Never has a team looked so bad against a pitching staff that was supposed to be just ordinary and had completed only 23 games during the American League season.

The Dodgers didn't get a hit until Lou Johnson singled with one out in the fourth. Tommy Davis promptly rapped into a double play.

After Lefebvre led off the fifth with a single, Brooks Robinson came up with a fine play on Wes Parker's hard ground ball and turned it into a double play. In the sixth, John Kennedy singled, but was cut down trying to steal while Drysdale was striking out.

Baltimore had a threat going in the second when Brooks Robinson singled and Curt Blefary walked with one out. But Dave Johnson grounded into a double play.

Trailing, 10-2, in the last of the seventh inning (and 10.3 going into the eighth), the Eagles bounced back to the Springhill Alpines, 11-11 to force Saturday's Maritime Intermediate "A" Baseball Semi-Finals here into overtime.

Springhill finally won all the marbles with a scratch single in the 11th frame, to cop the best-of-three round two games to none, winning Saturday, 12-11, after topping the Airmen, 13-7 in Springhill, N.S., last weekend. The victorious Alpines now meet Bathurst Jets for the Maritime Title.

The Nova Scotia winners appeared to have everything in hand when they scored four in the first inning, added singletons in the third, fourth and fifth, before adding a trio in the seventh. Summerside, meanwhile, were countering with one in the third, fourth, and seventh innings, before they exploded for five in the eighth and three in the ninth.

In the 11th inning, Jack Bourgeois doubled to center, and

brought in another run in the third, and a triple by Bourgeois, plus an accompanying error, brought in run No. 6 in the fourth. A single and wild pitch in the fifth made the score, 7-2, and Springhill added three more in the seventh on a single, error, and three walks.

Summerside RCAF left 10 men stranded on the basepaths through the first six innings as they pecked away for single runs in the third, fourth and seventh. The eighth inning five-run rally came on consecutive walks to Schurman and Crawford, singles by Allen, Martin, and Puchniak, and a free ticket to Doug MacDonald.

Bourgeois scored Springhill's sixth run after tripling in the fourth frame. He scored when the ball got by third sacker Puchniak. The mining town's catcher Art Landry had three singles in five trips to the plate.

Doug Allen paced the Summerside attack with four hits in six trips. Paul MacWilliams had a double and single, and with two singles each were Clair Puchniak and Spider Crawford. Jerry Remington started for Springhill, but the second reliever Don MacManaman in the ninth took the win. MacManaman is a Springhill boy stationed at the local base.

In the second inning, Springhill scored four times on two hits, five walks, and an error. Two of the runs came home on Austin Williams' double.
