

Soviet Ambassador Hides In Cellar From Students

LUXEMBOURG (Reuters)—Police Tuesday night found the Soviet ambassador to Luxembourg in all his uniform—locked in a cellar after 2,000 students had stormed and set fire to the Soviet Embassy.

The students surged on the embassy—it was a legation until recently—just as guests were beginning to arrive for a vodka and caviar party to celebrate today's October Revolution Day.

Embassador Yvan Mielnik took refuge in the cellar as the demonstrators fired some of the embassy rooms and burned furniture, including a portrait of Mrs. Nikita Khrushchev, wife of the Russian Communist party chief.

Students, joined by other demonstrators protesting against Soviet action in Hungary, stormed into the grounds after ripping down railings and bursting through police cordons.

BARRICADED IN ATTIC
Inside the embassy, two of the party guests and members of the 70-strong embassy staff barricaded themselves in the attic.

Furniture was hurled from the windows and set alight and flames enveloped a car in the grounds.

While the embassy was being besieged, a messenger arrived with a note that the Luxembourg government had decided not to attend the party.

OTHER PROTESTS
Mean while demonstrations against the Russian action in Hungary were reported from other world capitals.

In Brussels, 8,000 students battled police. Some 40 demonstrators and 20 policemen were injured four of them seriously.

About 10,000 persons marched through Bonn, Germany. Strong police forces guarded the Russian embassy as 1,500 youths staged a demonstration.

Traffic throughout West Germany halted for three minutes at noon.

Demonstrations took place in Rome and Milan, Italy. Thousands of Portuguese students stormed through Lisbon streets shouting anti-Russian slogans.

Scores of Paris police surrounded the office of the Communist newspaper Humanite when several hundred students gathered.

Police and demonstrators fought in Stockholm, Sweden when they were prevented from marching on the Soviet embassy.

In Buenos Aires, Argentina, a crowd of 200 students broke the windows of the Soviet embassy.

Babies Survive Several Days With Dead Mother

OWEN SOUND, Ont. (CP)—Two naked infants lived for several days with their mother dead in an unheated farmhouse near here last week.

They fed themselves by puncturing cans of milk with a screw-driver, eating bread crusts, raw meat and pastry. They suffered only cut feet from glass jars they smashed on the floor.

Their mother, 38-year-old Mrs. Ruth Smith, died after a lengthy illness in their home 15 miles from here.

The children, John and Gordon 2 and 3, were found huddled near their mother's body Sunday by her estranged husband, Ernie Smith, 38-year-old district millworker.

"Judging from the mess in that house, they must have been left for at least five days, maybe more," said Ernest Speck, grand-uncle of the children who now is caring for them.

"I think the bigger boy knew Ruth was dead, but he won't talk about it," Smith found his wife was dead on the littered kitchen floor. His children were in each other's arms on a couch, shivering from a wind coming through a broken window and a back door they were apparently unable to close.

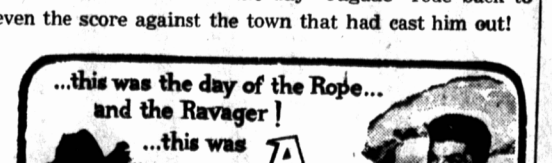
Mrs. Lottie McEwen, has received word from members of her family who were home for a family re-union some time ago, that they had all arrived back at their homes again, after a long trip.

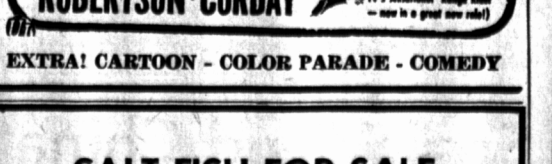
