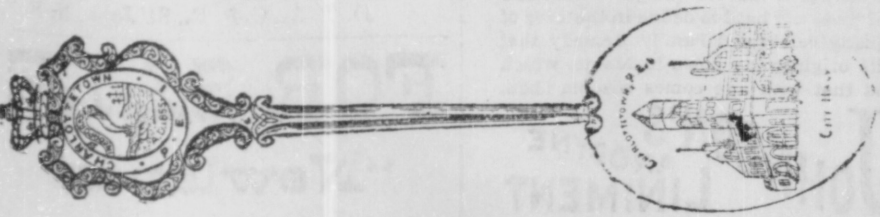

MORE BOERS HAVE SURRENDERED

General Hutton Has Another Scrap.

BRITISH OFFICERS AND MEN KILLED AND WOUNDED

On Account of a Gallant Attempt to Rescue a Wounded Comrade.

[SPECIAL TO THE EXAMINER.]

LONDON, July 10.—Lord Roberts telegraphs the War Office from Pretoria: The officer commanding at Veilbron reports that State Secretary Bliignant, State Attorney Dickson and the members of the Council of Vantader and Kuppervirgen came in yesterday and surrendered.

General Hutton was attacked yesterday in the position he was holding by a large number of Boers. He beat them off without much difficulty, the five inch guns with him being found very useful.

Our only casualty was Lt. Young of the first mounted troops, who received a slight scalp wound.

The enemy left several wounded on the ground and sent a flag of truce with the request that they might be received in our field hospital.

I regret to say that Captain Currie and Lieutenant Kirk, of the Imperial Light Horse, who were reported wounded in my telegram of yesterday, were both killed. One squadron of this distinguished corps pressed a very strong force of the enemy in a gallant attempt to carry off a wounded comrade to which they attributed the heavy loss sustained.

In addition to the officers, a farrier sergeant and three troopers were killed and a sergeant-major and three sergeants and seven troopers wounded.

A Cause for Uneasiness.

ANOTHER WAR ON HAND

Afridis on the War Path

ATTACK TWO HUNDRED AFGHANS AND KILL A NUMBER OF THEM.

Feared Another Afridi's War is Brewing.

LONDON, July 10.—Advices express from the Pasha in Panjuba, under date of June 19th, says: Six hundred Afridis made a sudden night descent on two hundred Afghans who were engaged in building a fort near Deacca, and killed a number of them. It is feared in some official Indian circles that another Afridis war is brewing.

EMPEROR WILLIAM.

Will not Rest Till China is Subdued.

KIEL July 9.—The German East Asiatic squadron sailed this morning for China.

KIEL July 10.—Addressing the first naval division prior to its departure for China, yesterday, Emperor William said: Your's is the first division to fight a cunning foe, provided with modern weapons to avenge the German blood which has flown.

"I shall not rest till China is subdued and all the bloody deeds are avenged. You will fight together with troops of various nationalities. See that you maintain good comradeship with them.

ORANGEMEN AT KINGSTON

A Touching Service and Eloquent Sermon.

The members of King William Orange Lodge attended Divine service in a body, on Sunday, July 8th, at Kingston. Rev. A. F. Brown preached a very loyal and patriotic sermon. After reading the last chapter of Revelations he called on Brother McLean who sang with much effect, "The Shepherd True." The attention given was perfect, and every heart must have been touched. The text was taken from the book of Jude, 3rd verse, "Exhorting you to contend earnestly for the faith which was once for all delivered unto the saints." He exhorted the brethren to be faithful and firm in all their efforts for the uplifting of mankind. He most heartily endorsed the work done by the Loyal Orange Association and strongly advised all present to take Jesus our Elder Brother for their example. Not poor man who is so apt to err and prove unrightful. His sermon was listened to with breathless attention and was interspersed with several anecdotes from the American war giving great encouragement for christians to be always on the attack. After the congregation was dismissed the members of the order re-formed and marched back to the hall where a hearty vote of thanks was passed to Rev. A. F. Brown, Evangelist McLean and the choir.

JAPAN SENDS ANOTHER DIVISION

23,000 Men and 5,000 Horses.

THIS ACTION ENDORSED BY THE PRESS.

Harmony Continues Among All The Powers.

YOKOHAMA, July 10.—The Government has finally decided to immediately despatch 23,000 men and 5,000 horses to China.

The newspapers are endorsing this action, point out that should the foreigners at Peking perish, Japan could not be absolved from blame.

BERLIN, July 10.—The foreign office claims to have no later authentic news from Peking than that already published, and remains in doubt as to the fate of the whites.

Regarding the attitude of the Powers the Foreign Office officials said that they continue harmonious and that harmony just now is standing the first serious test, namely, the sending to China of another Japanese division.
