## Government To Provide Site For Summerside Swim Pool

SUMMERSIDE — The provincial cabinet announced yesterday it would agree to lease the area in the Prince County Vocational Institute where facilities for a swimming pool are partially complete to the town of Summerside for one dollar per year for 30 years.

The agreement was subject to a number of conditions, among them being the expense of completing the swimming pool is borne by the town or its agent, that access to the pool area be arranged with the principal of the PCVIS and all construction is approved by the department of public works.

The program to have the swimming pool completed has been undertaken by the Summerside Kinsmen Club and they have received the approval of the town to name the project as the Summerside Centennial project making it possible for the costs to be paid in part through Centennial grants.

At the regular meeting of the Kinsmen Club, Premier Walter R. Shaw announced the government would give a special grant of \$8,000 over and above the province's Centennial grant. This \$8,000 is the same amount as was given to the Charlotte-

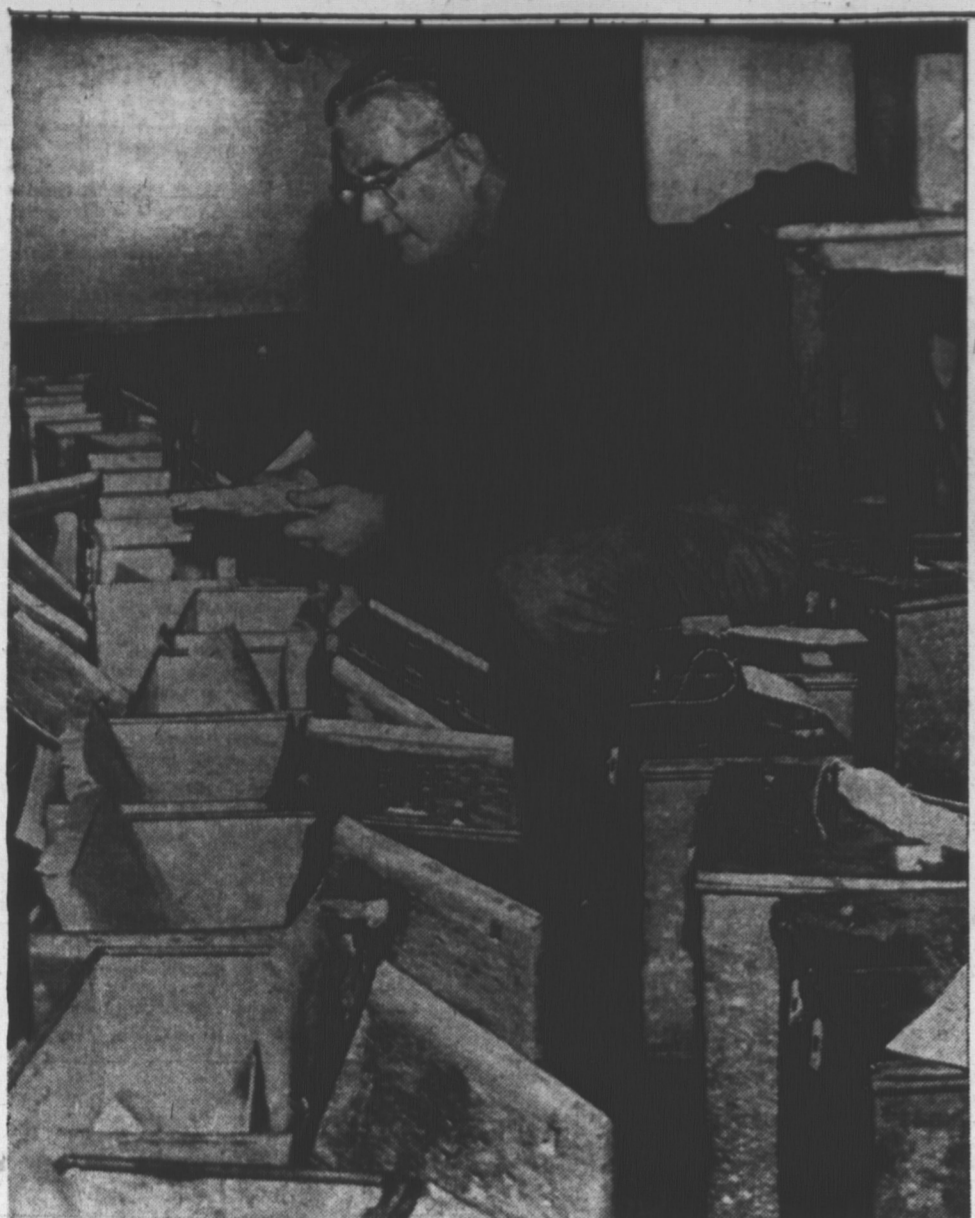
**IMPAIRED DRIVING**

## Premier Shaw And Cabinet Hold Summerside Meeting

SUMMERSIDE — Premier Walter R. Shaw presented a cheque for \$27,000 to Herb Schurman, chairman of the public works committee of the Summerside Town Council, yesterday at a luncheon held in Summerside attended by the provincial cabinet and the Town Council. The cheque was the province's share of the street paving done in Summerside during 1965.

Under a program set up in 1960 the province will pay 60 per cent of street paving in an incorporated town on the Island. In thanking the Premier Mayor George Key pointed out Summerside had received over \$116,000 since the inception of the program.

"Without this assistance, we would have had to go to the bond market for the money," said Mayor Key, "where the interest and debenture charges would have amounted \$68,000."

Early in the morning Premier Shaw and members of the provincial cabinet, with the exception of Fisheries Minister Leo Rossiter, viewed the construction of the new wing to the Prince County Hospital, where a brief ceremony the Premier assisted in the steel erection by taking a couple of wrenches and fastening one of the bolts to hold the steel work firm.

Leaving the construction site, the Premier and his party toured some of the wards in the hospital greeting the patients and the staff. One of the doctors asked the premier if he had spotted any Conservatives in the hospital. "I don't go about spotting Tories," said Premier Shaw, "but I can smell a Grit 100 miles away."

## Insurance Cost Increase Seen

HALIFAX — An "accident explosion" across Canada will bring increases in the cost of automobile insurance in 1966. A Toronto insurance executive predicted today.

J.B. Humphrey, past president of All Canada Insurance Federation, said he expected that rates would rise about six per cent across the country with decreases in a few areas and larger increases in others.

All Canada, although not a rate-establishing organization represents most automobile insurance companies in Canada.

Mr. Humphrey said that accident frequency and cost had risen continually since 1961 and that the forthcoming increases are "based on our prediction that the accident explosion is going to be even worse in 1966."

"Accident costs, which contribute to higher insurance rates show every sign of increasing along with Canada's prosperity and steadily increasing standard of living," Mr. Humphrey said.

He said that changes in automobile design... efficient bumpers, roll-over fenders, and easier to repair body panels... could reduce the cost of automobile insurance by possibly 10 per cent. More stringent law enforcement would also help, he said, adding that Quebec automobile insurance rates are already beginning to show effects of an effective traffic safety program.
