## Prevalence Of Visual Disability Emphasized At Optometry Meeting

"A careful survey in Canada from coast to coast has revealed that one school child in three is suffering from visual disability," said Dean E. J. Fisher of the College of Optometry in Ontario in addressing the Maritime Optometric Association in annual convocation at the Charlottetown Hotel yesterday.

"These defects are not always apparent to the child himself," continued Dr. Fisher, "since he has never experienced anything affecting normal vision. Defective vision is frequently a cause of low marks and failure in school work. The child with poor eye relationship cannot read or do close work as well as his classmates. He may read with the use of a high amount of nervous energy which puts an undue strain on him and he finds he cannot compete with the rest of his class. Frequently these children become discouraged and drop out of school as soon as possible," the speaker said.

Dr. Fisher explained the different types of contract lenses now becoming common in Canada and the United States, particularly by those who require extremely strong lenses. They are also used freely by those who engage in sport activities.

Dr. J. P. Lantz contributed a highly informative address to the assembly on "Glaucoma," describing the various stages of development, and the need of prompt medical attention when the condition becomes apparent to the optometrist.

Dr. S. S. Gruppoco of the Bureau of Visual Science, American Optical Company, Southbridge, Mass., spoke of a new technique by which optometrists can better determine the spectacle correction of visual difficulties, and also on Aniseikonia, a relatively rare condition of the eyes in which the images differ in size or shape leading to various symptoms of discomfort to the afflicted person. The speaker indicated to the assembly the method of diagnosing this condition and outlined the method of treatment.

Mr. John Phelan of Fredericton, N.B., was elected president of the Association and Ron Wallace of Halifax, Vice President. Mr. Alphee LeBlanc, Grand Falls, Nfld., was elected Secretary Treasurer. The next annual meeting will be held at Fredericton, N.B.

## Tuna Tournay Delayed As Storm Scatters Fish

WEDGEPORT, N.S., (CP)—The battling bluefins disappeared from off the coast Tuesday as they went to sea hunting for food, driven away by Monday's hurricane, and the opening of the annual International Tuna Tournament was delayed a day.

Scheduled to open Wednesday, the tournament was delayed to Thursday. It continued until Saturday.

The hurricane which ripped along the coast Monday drove herding and mackerel, principal diet of the tuna, out to sea and the bluefins followed. The same thing happened three years ago and the catch was the lowest in years.

Tournament officials figured that by Thursday at least some of the tuna will have returned to the churning waters of Soldier's Rip just off the shore from this western Nova Scotia village.

Before the storm hit prospects for a heavy catch this year had been good. More than 100 tuna had been caught during the last two months.

Ten teams are competing this year, with France and The Netherlands newcomers. Other teams are from Brazil, the British Commonwealth, Cuba, Mexico, the United States, Venezuela, Chile, and Argentina.

Star member of the Commonwealth team is Cmdr. Duncan M. Hodgson of Montreal, who holds the world's record for tuna caught on rod and line with a 977-pounder landed off Cape Breton three years ago.

Points are allowed each day for the weight of fish landed, largest number caught by a team and largest fish of the day.

Cuba, three-time winner of the Sharp trophy, is defending champion. They won last year with a catch in the dying minutes of the tournament.

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But the outer bar has only 10 to 12 feet of water over it at high tide, and it is questionable whether salvage vessels will be able to tow the ship to deep water.

The ship's New York agents sent a salvage expert to make a survey and determine if salvage is possible.

The chief engineer, Loucas Coutouris, 39, was brought ashore today in a U.S. coast guard dory to talk with the ship's agents by telephone.

Coutouris told reporters that the slamming seas smashed a control bar on the rudder 15 minutes before the ship was swept ashore.

The master of the vessel, Capt. Elais Parelis, remained aboard the ship with five other members of the crew. The remainder of the crew of 24 men were taken off Monday by breeches buoy and an amphibious duck.

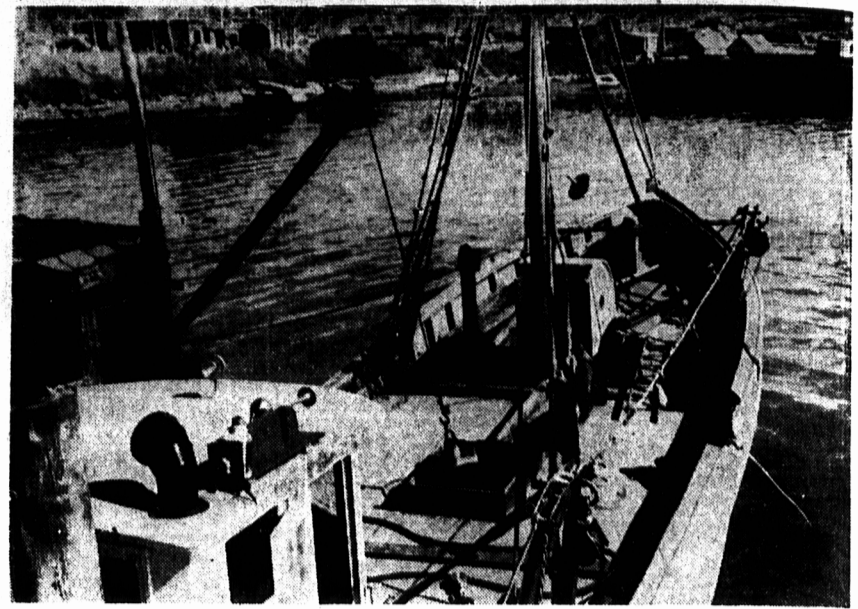

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### Red Agents Report Ammunition Pouring Into North Korea
