TO BE TRIED FOR MURDER.—The preliminary examination of Archibald McGowan, charged with the murder of Maggie Mackenzie, will begin this evening at Georgetown before Stipendiary Magistrate Blanchard. Miss Mackenzie, it will be remembered, was murdered last autumn. McGowan was found near the place where the crime was committed, and was suspected of being the murderer and arrested. But it was found that he was insane and he was committed to the lunatic asylum instead of to the jail. Since then he has recovered his mental faculties and he will now be tried, charged with the crime. A bill will be laid before the Grand Jury, which meets at Georgetown to-morrow, and if a true bill is returned the trial will come off at the coming term. The Chief Justice will preside and the crown will be represented by H. James Palmer and D. A. McKinnon, and the prisoner will be defended by W. A. O. Morson, Q. C.
