Continued from page 4 with the exception of two rooms, following a start in this direction made two years ago.

An important addition to the hospital was the installation of an emergency diesel electric plant to provide light in the event of a power failure. The kitchen has been improved by the installation of a deep freeze for fish which permits a constant supply of fresh fish so necessary for the dieticians to plan in accordance with physicians' instructions.

A ten thousand gallon bunker fuel oil tank has been installed to supplement the standing unit of similar capacity which had developed a defect which could not be dealt with in the cold weather. Both are now in effective use.

Mr. MacLean paid tribute to the services of Mr. Arthur Mould who relinquished his position as business manager in August after seven years of service. Other staff changes were the appointment of Mrs. Leard as housemother at the Nursing School in succession to Mrs. Affleck who resigned, and the appointment of Miss Florence MacLean to the staff as director of nursing education, and Miss Barbara Pratt as class and clinical instructor.

Fourteen nurses graduated from the Training School during the year and fifteen girls have started their training. The staff now numbers 170 including student nurses.

The total income of the hospital for the year was \$464,204.82 and expenditure total \$461,411.10. The report extended thanks to the members of the medical staff who have given so freely of their time in the care of free patients, in lecturing and instructing nurses and for their general co-operation. The ladies' organizations, whose members are rendering constant selfless service to the hospital, and the staff members were also thanked. The press and clergy and the many friends and supporters of the hospital were also referred to with gratitude.

Other Reports Following the reading and acceptance of the Trustees' report, Mr. J. R. Likely submitted his report as Treasurer as did also Miss MacLean for the Nursing School.

The various reports were received with great pleasure and adopted following expressions of thanks and appreciation from many of those in attendance.

Resolutions of appreciation were passed commending the trustee board, hospital staff and nurses, medical staff, the clergy, press and radio, and unsolicited anonymous donors who have done much in the interest of the hospital, and those served by the institution.

Judge H. L. Palmer, Dr. MacKenzie and Mr. E. A. Cudmore, the three retiring trustees were re-elected for a further period of three years. Mr. John VanMaarion was elected to replace Mr. Claude Smith who recently resigned from the board.

Immediately following the general meeting the trustees held a meeting at which Mr. N. D. MacLean was re-elected chairman, Mr. J. H. Howatt, vice-chairman and Mr. J. A. Likely, secretary-treasurer.

The annual meeting was opened with prayer by Rev. T. H. B. Somers and closed with the benediction by Rev. Canon J. T. Ibbott.

CHICOUTIMI, Que. (CP)—Rolly Hebert, coach of the Chicoutimi Sagueneens of the Quebec Hockey League, threatened Thursday not to take his team to Montreal for a game against the Royals Sunday unless a television dispute between the two teams is ironed out.

Hebert charged that the regular Sunday afternoon telecasts from the Montreal Forum are cutting attendance and depriving the visiting teams of their share of the gate. The visitors get 15 cents from each admission ticket.

The Royals, however, are losing nothing since they have an agreement with the sponsors of the telecasts, Hebert said.

The Chicoutimi manager said he would meet with Montreal officials Friday night in an attempt to settle the dispute.
