## Maritime Sportsmen Form Interprovincial Ass'n At Meeting On "Abegweit"

Mr. W.A. Fox of Amherst, N.S. was elected President of the Interprovincial Fish and Game Association of the three Maritime Provinces when it was unanimously agreed at the second annual meeting of Maritime sportsmen on board the ferry Abegweit Tuesday evening to continue holding such yearly gatherings. Delegates were present from the following branches of the various Fish and Game Associations of the Maritimes: Prince Edward Island, Moncton, Amherst, Springhill and Kentville.

Dick Andres of Amherst was named secretary of the new organization and the three presidents of the provincial Fish and Game Associations, F.A.S. Jones of Charlottetown, Ott Hicks of Moncton and James Donnelly of Mill Village, N.S., were elected vice presidents.

Creation of a permanent tri-province setup assured the continuation of the Northumberland Straits meeting of Maritime sportsmen. However, it was the general feeling of the meeting that the gathering should be held earlier in the season when weather conditions would be more favorable.

### Island Deer Discussed

Prince Edward Island's twelve deer also came in for mention during the meeting. After Hon. A.W. MacKenzie, Nova Scotia's Minister of Agriculture and Forest and Lands, had stated that his province was now over populated with deer and that 45,000 had been killed last year, Lawrence St. Clair Baird of Kentville, a past president of the Nova Scotia Fish and Game Association said that if the Island deer do as well as Nova Scotia's, it would leave nothing to be desired. He said that eleven deer had been brought into Nova Scotia back in 1894 at a cost of \$163. They were released at Lake Jolly in Digby County and today the deer population of Nova Scotia is a quarter of a million.

Ted Williams, Graham Cochrane and Owen MacPherson from Halifax St. Mary's have joined Meripacs and with Syl Bernard of Summerside, and Tommy Mahar, Bridgewater, will hold down defence positions. Three lads from the Valley League, Bill Foley, Dave Frawley and Laurie Burgridge will make up a new forward line. In the nets will be Frankie Prozenor, former Stellarton goalie.

Truro Bears'ats, reportedly strengthened by several newcomers, will meet Meripacs Friday in their first game. Bears'ats are something of a dark horse, with coach Frank Grabowski refusing to release advance information.

### Different Situation Here

Dr. Smith said that an entirely different geological situation exists in Prince Edward Island than in the trout areas of New Brunswick and Nova Scotia. Island ponds are fertile, the water is cool in summer, spawning conditions are good, there is an abundance of small trout, farm fertilizers wash into the stream enhancing fertility, and there are no predators in Island brooks.

"The basic problem on the Island is a scarcity of water of suitable size to rear trout," said Dr. Smith who is in charge of trout surveys in the Maritimes. He also spoke of a survey which has been going on at Montague pond for the past seven years. This 23-acre pond produces upwards of four thousand trout a year which Dr. Smith termed "very good."

In Prince Edward Island, he said, fishermen catch an average of two and one-half trout an hour all summer. In other Maritime fishing areas they catch only one trout an hour and only during the months of May and June.

Dr. Smith, in the course of his talk, also spoke of the technical aspects of another trout experiment being carried out in Prince Edward Island. This one is at Ellerslie and has to do with sea trout. Experts are trying to establish what effect some new dam projects would have on sea trout. He said the Ellerslie experiment was unique in that fences are maintained on the stream throughout the entire year.

### Muskrat Trappers

Mr. Wright traced some of the developments in the various experiments which are being carried on among waterfowl and upland game birds in the Maritimes. He spoke of a five-year survey of black ducks and mentioned the damage caused by muskrat trappers in areas where muskrats and ducks congregate. "Take the muskrat trappers out of areas where breeding ducks and muskrats are concentrated," he said. Spring rat trapping should be abolished April 1 each year, Mr. Wright said, and Prince Edward Island has taken the lead in controlling this particular problem.

Speaking of big game in the Maritimes, the Fredericton wildlife man said that the "carrying capacity" of range land in New Brunswick is "near its peak insofar as deer is concerned. There is an overabundance of deer."

One other thing that Mr. Wright told the meeting and something that every member of the sportsmen's organization present listened to with more than usual interest was the disclosure that there is almost positive proof now that there are panthers in New Brunswick. Mr. Wright said "the Eastern panther is by no means as rare as thought." He said that one man in New Brunswick had shot a panther recently and, although the man disposed of the animal, there was a photograph to prove the story. There are also 101 "sight" records of panther.

### Films Showed

Through the co-operation of Stan MacInnis of the National Film Board, who also showed several fine sportsmen films during the evening, Mr. Wright showed slides depicting the capture and bending of baby woodcock.

Dr. Smith was introduced by Dick Found of Ellerslie and Mr. Wright by Ott Hicks.

The 60 or more Maritime sportsmen who attended the Abegweit meeting had their chance to discuss their problems at the second table discussion affair. W.A. Fox was chairman of that part of the meeting.

Among those who took part in the discussion were: P.A. Murnaghan, deputy minister of Industry and Natural Resources for P.E.I.; Hon. Mr. MacKenzie of Halifax; Hon. Merrill Rawding, Nova Scotia's Minister of Highways; Tupper Morrissey of Springhill, a former resident of Georgetown; Herb Vessey of Charlottetown; Reg Rogers of Summerside; B.G. Rogers of Charlottetown; Frank Doyle of Moncton, and Spurgeon Jenkins, game officer with the Department of Industry and Natural Resources.
