ABANDONED AT SEA.—Messrs. All hands were saved and landed at Liverpool or London. The Minnie Butler was a vessel of 120 tons register, and was built at Halifax nine years ago. She was loaded with fish.—*St. John Telegraph*.

TELEGRAPHIC NEWS.

Triumph of Temperance.

SCOTT ACT VICTORIOUS.

Large Majorities.

OTTAWA, Oct. 10. Two Scott Act contests took place yesterday, and in each the friends of temperance won.

In Stanstead County, Quebec, where in the former contest, the Act was defeated on a vote of 760 yeas to 941 nays, it was carried by 247 majority yesterday.

In the County of Simcoe and Parry Sound, districts which were grouped in one vote, the Act was carried by from 1,000 to 1,200 majority.

Terrible Accident.

NASHVILLE, Tenn., Oct. 10.

A terrible accident has occurred at Wren's Furnace, Kichham County. It was a rule that a signal should be given before tapping the furnace that the blasts may be shut off and all men get out of danger. The tapper, through neglect, tapped the furnace before the signal was given and three men standing near were covered by a seething mass of melted iron and two of them were burned to death instantly.

The other man attempted to get out of the way, and waded through the melted iron, walking over 100 yards, and lived two hours in great agony. The flesh dropped off all of their bodies, leaving the bones almost bare. The tapper was also burned fatally. A mule and cart standing near were consumed by the river of melted iron which poured out of the furnace.

Egyptian News.

CAIRO, Oct. 10.

The Sheikhs of tribes between Khartoum and Shendi have arrived at Ambukol, and tendered their submission to the Egyptian Government.

Col. Kitchener, who is at Ambukol, telegraphs that a rumor is current there that the rebels have captured three Europeans with their dragoon. If this report is true, the prisoners are presumably Col. Stewart, Mr. Power, correspondent of the London Times, and Mr. Herbin, French Consul at Khartoum.

There is some hope that the lives of these three men may have been spared. One hundred row boats forming part of the Nile expedition have arrived at Assouan. The Canadian contingent has passed Assouan in a steamer.

Fatal Accident.

HAMILTON, Ont., Oct. 10.

There were four men killed outright and several wounded by the explosion at the Hamilton Powder Mills yesterday.

Another Fatal Accident.

WILKESBARRE, Pa., Oct. 10.

A heavy fall of top rock took place in red ash mine this morning. Two miners were killed.

Great Fire.

PAITA, Peru, Oct. 10.

A fire here last night consumed a quarter of the town. The damage is estimated at \$200,000.

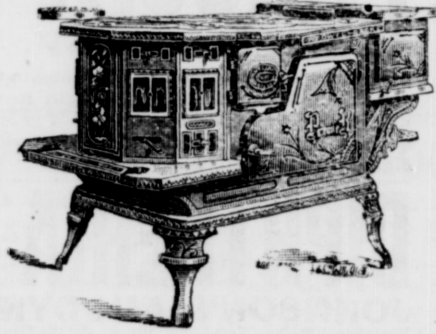
