Another Break up on Wall Street

NEW YORK, June 24. Great excitement was occasioned on Wall Street by the suspension of the old banking House of Matthew Morgan & Sons, J. W. Barnham, of the firm of Holch, Kess & Barnham, of Broad Street, lately failed, committed suicide this morning. He was much depressed on account of the failure of the firm.

Railway Accident.

SUNBURY, Pa., June 24. A freight train was wrecked here yesterday, and the engine returning from the scene of the disaster to day collided with a passenger train near Shamokin killing three men and badly injuring others. Both engines were demolished.

Nihilism.

ST. PETERSBURG, June 24. Thirty-two Nihilists have been arrested in Kishineff and over a hundred in Kieff. Reports of anti-Jewish riots at Nizhane Novgorod are confirmed. Several Jews were killed. One hundred and fifty arrests have been made.

A Tunnel Caved In.

STENEYSVILLE, Ohio, June 24. A portion of the Gould tunnel on the Panhandle Road, west of here, caved in this morning, burying eight laborers, four of whom were taken out alive.

MARSEILLES, June 24. Travellers assert that eighteen deaths by cholera have occurred at Toulon.
