ANNUAL MEETING OF THE DIOCESAN CHURCH SOCIETY.

The annual general meeting of the Diocesan Church Society, was held in St. Paul's Church last evening, His Lordship the Chief Justice presiding.

The report of the Committee, read by Rev. David Fitzgerald, regrets that the missions of Cherry Valley and Georgetown have been with the Rev. Mr. Hind in since the removal of the Rev. Mr. Hind in May last, with the exception of three months, when the Rev. Dr. Wright, of Montreal, was in charge of the Georgetown Mission. The removal of Rev. T. B. Reagh, also leaves the New London Mission vacant, though the vacancy was partially filled for a time by Mr. Harper who has resumed his studies at King's College. To meet the withdrawal of the grants of the Home Societies, the Committee earnestly urge more strenuous efforts on the part of Church people throughout the Province.

REPORTS OF LOCAL CLERGY.

Rev. David Fitzgerald reports that the usual services have been held regularly throughout the year, the Sunday School reports are improved, and the Wednesday evening Bible Class well attended and appreciated. The Ladies' Clothing Society, the Industrial Aid Society, and the Mite Society have all been doing good work. Since its establishment, three years ago, the Mite Society has collected \$1,736.91. In the year, about 200 pastoral visits were paid, and there were thirty four baptisms, six marriages, and eighteen burials; collections about \$4,000.

Rev. Geo. W. H. Higson reports that during the year there were several changes in the staff of workers in connection with St. Peter's Church. Rev. R. D. Bambrick and Mr. Wilson resigned their positions, which are now filled by Rev. W. B. King and Mr. K. C. Hind, respectively, and Miss Harris has resumed her work as teacher of the girls school. The services of the Church have been kept up as provided by the prayer book; and during the past six months there has been a decided increase in the attendance at the Sunday services. The debt of the Church has, through the labors of the Sewing Society, been reduced by the payment of \$400; and the debt still due does not now much exceed \$700. The most marked event of the year has been the mission preached by the Rev. E. Osborne, a member of the English Society of St. John the Evangelist. Great interest was manifested in the Mission; and a great impression was made in those who heard the powerful appeals made to them to turn from sin and come to the Savior.

The Venerable Archdeacon read reports that the Mission in Milton and North Pittsburg has improved spiritually and financially. The congregations continue as large as ever, and there is an evident earnestness in the scriptural services in which they take part. The past year has been notable in the deaths of three of the oldest parishioners, whose united ages were 244 years. One of them had attained her one hundredth year, and as a mother, a neighbor and a member of the Church of England was most exemplary. In the year the Archdeacon travelled 2,937 miles, paid 663 visits, married 7 couples, baptized 7 persons, and buried 13 parishioners; collected, \$876.91.

Rev. T. B. Reagh reports an improvement in all things connected with the Mission at Port Hill. The Sunday School, conducted by Thomas Adams, Miss S. Yeo, and Miss Birch, was closed in November after a very satisfactory catechism. Bible classes were organized in August last, and several persons are being prepared as teachers for the coming summer. The number of communicants in the Parish is still small, though several have made the first communion since last autumn. Everything in the people's power has been done for their clergyman. The Rectory has been much improved, and there have been many kind tokens of sympathy in the shape of substantial gifts. The people favor an endowment of the Parish for the support of their clergyman. Baptisms 16, marriages 2, burials 4, celebrations 14; collections \$256.56.

Rev. T. B. Reagh regrets that a sense of duty withdrew him from the parish of New London. In his absence, Mr. Henry Harper, a Divinity student of King's College, held regular services from the last July to the 1st October, and during the Christmas holidays. The congregations at New London and Irish-ton were both large, and the Sunday Schools well attended. Although now without a clergyman, the people have thoroughly repaired the Church at Irish-ton, and intend to build a tower next summer, after which it will be a credit to the Mission. Baptisms, twenty-three, marriages four, burials ten, celebrations twenty-seven, collections \$315.00.

Rev. Theobald Richey reports that the work of the Church has been carried on with regularity in St. Eleanor's and Summer-side. A cheering feature is the increased interest of the young. An entertainment at Ludlow Hall on New Year's Day realized \$225. Baptisms, 17; marriages, 4; burials, 18.

Rev. R. W. Dyer is thankful to report that since the roads became passable he has been able to attend to all his appointments, and has had much encouragement in all his duties. The Church in his Mission has not only held her own, but has increased in good ratio. The attendance at St. Peter's, Alberton, has been good and regular, and the Sunday School fairly attended during the summer months. At Kildare, Montrose, Casumpec Village and Carleton, Lot 6, services have been held and well attended. Marriages, 7; baptisms, 24; burials, 13; celebrations, 21.

Rev. T. W. Johnstone, of Crapaud and Springfield, reports that good and devout congregations of regular church-goers meet for worship; all debts have been paid or cancelled, five flourishing Sunday Schools are in operation. St. John's Church and parsonage have been put in thorough repair, and the former furnished with a bell, an organ, a stone font, etc.; and above all a deep and earnest spirit is being aroused among the people. A building has been purchased at Victoria, which, when repaired, will be used for week day evening and occasional Sunday services, and for a Sunday School. The Ven. Archdeacon presented one of the Sunday Schools with a library of books, and the people have been liberal in their offerings. The collections amounted to \$530.04.

That while this meeting desires to record its thanks to those Home Societies who have for many years materially assisted the country districts of this Province in keeping up the ministrations of the Church, it would impress upon the members of the Church generally the necessity of making some vigorous efforts to raise an Endowment Fund in their respective Districts which would meet the withdrawal of those grants.

Moved by H. J. Cundall, seconded by Dr. Leeming:—

That the thanks of this meeting be given to the Collectors of the Society and that such of the members of the Society and that such of the members of the present Executive Committee as have paid their subscriptions be re-appointed, that the Secretary and Treasurer be re-appointed, and that Mr. David B. Stewart be the assistant Secretary for the ensuing year.

Moved by R. R. Fitzgerald, Esq., seconded by Charles Palmer, Esq.:—

Resolved, That a subscription list be now opened in this Parish for the support of an itinerant Missionary Clergyman to travel through this Province during the summer months, and that similar lists be opened in all the other Parishes on the Island, such lists to be transmitted to an adjourned meeting to be held on the first day of May next.

Another Digby Murder.

HALIFAX, Feb. 8. At a dance at Marshalford, Digby County, N. S., on Tuesday night, James Wootley during a row shot and killed Dennis Hutchison. The affair creates great excitement throughout the country.

Senator Plumb of Niagara.

OTTAWA, Feb. 8. Mr. J. B. Plumb, late M. P. of Niagara, has been raised to the Senate. Mr. Plumb was first returned to Parliament in 1874, and continued to represent Niagara until the constituency was remodelled last year.

PARIS, Feb. 8. The French Senate Committee has drafted a report rejecting the Bill for the expulsion of pretenders to the throne of France.

Marine Disasters.

LONDON, Feb. 8. An unknown steamer foundered on Friday last off Cornwall, all hands on board were lost.

A bottle was picked up on the shore at Bournemouth, containing a paper with information regarding the steamer "Nederland" on passage from Antwerp for New York. It says she was dismasted in the gale and in great danger.

[The steamer "Nederland" is 2,800 tons, was built in New Castle in 1873, and is owned by the Belgian American Steam Navigation Co.]

Steamer Foundered—Thirty-two Drowned.

LONDON, Feb. 8. The steamer "Shukemase Castle" on passage from London to Shanghai, has foundered in the Bay of Biscay. Eight passengers and eight of the crew were rescued, but the balance of the crew—thirty-two in number—were drowned.

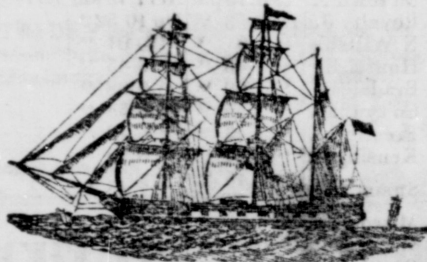
