Let's Talk It Over

A Prince County Viewpoint

The Summerside Branch of the Canadian Legion, which has a reputation for taking an active interest in matters affecting the welfare of Summerside, (witness its generous offer of \$15,000 towards the building of a new rink in the town, and its sponsorship of minor hockey this year), has come to the fore again, this time in co-operation with the mother organization, with definite proposals for Summerside and Prince County's protection in case of war.

There is a kind of apathy and indifference among our people regarding the perils that might become involved in global war. We on this side of the Atlantic have been fortunate because the two Great Wars beginning in 1914 and 1939, though depriving us of some of the flower of our manhood, did not bring their ruthlessness and savagery to our doors. Non-combatants in North America have only a remote idea how the hot breath of war can sear a countryside, what a panic can be created by bombs falling on a country which has given no thought of, or made no provision for such a contingency.

While other countries of the world have had to face these trials we have remained unscathed. And this freedom from invasion and bombardment has developed a complacency which may have reached even into the higher council chambers of our Government. "It cannot happen here" is a theory we must throw overboard for good. It may not happen here, but God grant that wise statesmanship and a spirit of compromise in high world circles will see to it that it does not happen here. But it is the course of wisdom to get ready for unpleasant eventualities. Wishful thinking betrayed more than one country in the perilous years since 1914.

The men of the Legion, because of the training of their valiant forefathers, are of necessity men of a boldness, whose action spoke so very much louder than words. They are demanding action now, instead of words. The three points of their program are: 1. National Registration. 2. Mobilization of industrial resources for defence production. 3. Compulsory training in the reserve forces. It is to be devoutly hoped that, while conscription has been ruled out for the present by the Prime Minister, these proposed provisions of "operation preparedness" will be given careful consideration by our Government, and that implementation of the points approved will not be long delayed.
