**Domestic Science, Art Work, Handicrafts Are Displayed**

Additional space provided this year for these classes is still scarcely sufficient to display them to good advantage. Entries of domestic science are far in excess of those shown in any previous year. In some sections there were 12 or more entries. The display of canned fruit and vegetables is outstanding. There were numerous attractive entries of crochet, sewing and other forms of needlecraft worthy of commendation. The only entry of weaving was a baby's bonnet by Mrs. Fred Leard. **33RD EVENT CONTINUES TODAY**

**Annual Fair At Alberton Said Greatest In History**

ALBERTON BUREAU OF THE GUARDIAN Believed the greatest exhibition in the history of the Alberton Fair, the 33rd annual event started yesterday and will continue today. Over 80 more exhibitors are showing than in last year's exhibition and judges believe the quality is superior to other years. Presiding at the official opening yesterday afternoon, President Lester Wallace introduced the special guests on the stand and they all spoke briefly. Premier A. W. Matheson congratulated the directors and management and called on all Prince County citizens to support their efforts. Mayor Winston Currie of Alberton said such fairs had played a prominent part in the life of Island communities for a century and a half and he welcomed the thousands of visitors to Alberton for the occasion. Senator George H. Barbour said that small farms in this province were on the way out, as he stated that in 1956 there were 700 fewer farms than in 1951. On the basis he thought there were probably 1,000 fewer now. Other speakers heard briefly included Hon. Eugene Cullen, minister of agriculture, Walter R. Shaw, Progressive Conservative Leader, Dr. O.
