Roll call was taken and minutes of the last meeting were read and approved. The supply secretary, Mrs. Leon Johnston reported the spring box for overseas relief had been sent. Miss Joyce Wigginton gave a very interesting talk on the needs and life in Korea. The devotional period was led by Mrs. Leon Johnston, assisted by Mrs. Gordon Coffin. A reading from the study book was given by Mrs. George Preece. A report was then taken by the literature secretary of the books read by members. There were nine hospital calls, twenty cards, fifteen cards and nine treats reported for the month of June. The meeting closed with the Mizpah benediction. Lunch was served and a social hour enjoyed.

President Of women with the same problem. Thus she showed that the initial concern of the Institute is with the home.

"A woman with an idea must have an unselfish interest of others," said the speaker and went on to show that although Mrs. Hoodless in spite of personal bereavement, devoted her efforts to saving other women from experiencing the same loss and at the same time turning her experience into progress and safety for the families of other mothers.

Mrs. Adams impressed upon her audience the importance of being themselves. She told them that women had no mean record of accomplishment and an unceasing habit of getting things done. She felt that failure to accomplish a task set forth was quite often due to a lack of conviction in the cause for which she was fighting. "We must be sure of our ground and then go ahead with courage and stick to our guns," she said.

The speaker made reference to the many rights women had gained over the past half century or so, such as franchise, equal opportunity for education, occupation and in some instances, equal pay.

Mrs. Adams said, "Within the Institute Movement," there is a real effort to understand one another and one another's problems "without division by Province or politics; by race or religion."

She went on to say, "When I write to P. E. I. mentioning the difficulty of our restrictive equal pay quota, I find that they are worrying about the root crops that remain in the cellar. When I write to Ontario that in the Prairie Provinces difficulties in rural life are being experienced because the people move to town, I find that Ontario is having trouble because the town folk are moving out and taking over the rich agricultural areas. But women who understand and feel the implications of each other's problems will not divide against each other or thrive on another's misfortune."

STRESSES ESSENTIALS

"Are we too busy," said the speaker, "to be concerned with the essentials of our task such as studies in food preparation, preservation in nutrition and health, in clothing needs and selection, in building and maintaining comfortable surroundings and in family relations?" It was her observation that a great many women concerned with the frivoli things, like a sewing piece on a quilt to send to Korea, when it would keep the Koreans just as warm if it were in one piece.

Mrs. Adams cautioned against a disorganized and poorly equipped community which she termed "a threat to your family." She pointed out that the effort must be a constructive one and went on to point out the need, not only in the local community but "For Home and Country."

Mrs. Adams referred to the United Nations as the nearest we have come to establishing a world community. She suggested the introduction of the topic in the community with a U.N. birthday cake; each candle lit by a little child who would tell of one accomplishment of the United Nations.

OTTAWA (CP) — Capt. John Deane, 44, of Vancouver and Nelson, B. C., will become assistant chief of naval technical services (ships) at naval headquarters in August, the navy announced Friday.

He will succeed Capt. John Caldwell, 40, of Amherst, N. S., and Aymer, Que., who is to commence a course at the National Defence College, Kingston, Ont., Sept. 1.

Capt. Deane will be succeeded as principal naval overseer at Sorel, Que., by Cmdr. Wilfred E. Smith, 40, of Fredericton, N. B., Aug. 6. Capt. Deane has held the appointment since October, 1952.

Banks Can Make Loans On Chattel Mortgages

OTTAWA (CP) — Canada's chartered banks now are free to make loans on automobiles, furniture and other chattel mortgages.

Legislation passed by the last session of Parliament, authorizing the banks to enter this lending field for the first time, was proclaimed on July 1, the government announced Friday in the Canada Gazette.

The authority was included in the decennial revision of the Bank Act which became law on Dominion Day.

RESOLUTIONS ADOPTED AT WOMEN'S INSTITUTE CONVENTION YESTERDAY

A recommendation asking the Provincial Government to make a study, with a view to implementing a planned programme based on long term principles for improved agriculture in all its phases, was passed at the annual convention of the Prince Edward Island Women's Institute yesterday.

The resolution arose from a panel discussion, of a report by Mr. W. R. Shaw made during a meeting of the Agricultural Council in Charlottetown last February, showing that many weaknesses existed in Island agricultural management, production and practices. It had been pointed out by Mr. Shaw that in spite of increased mechanical power and improved methods of soil management, examinations revealed that no improvements are noticeable.

A resolution, petitioning the Provincial Government to provide accommodation for all orthopedic patients requiring rehabilitation, was given the unanimous support of the convention when it was pointed out that the facilities at the disposal of the present polo unit were entirely inadequate.

The convention went on record as supporting a motion calling for the assistance of the Provincial Government in the establishment of a home for the mentally retarded children of the Province, and to take steps to establish a training and treatment program for these children.

The problem of juvenile delinquency came to the attention of the convention and a motion calling for a definite program of training and character building to be included in the school curriculum was passed.

Music Festival

It was also recommended that "a county music festival be conducted in Summerside and another in some center in King's County to run concurrently or consecutively with the Charlottetown Festival; that the adjudicators of these festivals be of equal standard to those of Charlottetown; that all festivals be operated under the same regulations and governing body."

The above resolution arose from discussions showing that the Charlottetown Festival can no longer cope with the large number of contestants and classes competing from all parts of the Province. It was further shown that the problem of transportation between Charlottetown and distant Western points on the Island was a serious difficulty and was enhanced by the necessity of some children making repeated trips to compete in more than one class. It was felt that two competitions within the one week on the same test piece develops a misplaced emphasis on competition.

MORNING SESSION

Mrs. Stewart MacGregor, East Baltic Convener of Home Economics reported to the Women's Institute session yesterday morning in the P.W.C. Auditorium, in the course of which she said: "This fall the Vocational School is offering for the first time a year's course in practical Home Economics instead of the previous six weeks course. The extended course will include instruction on

Qualified Teachers Required

"Our great need is more and better qualified teachers as now each student is required to do each of her 12 grades and at least one year of teacher training, thus eliminating young and immature teachers," Mrs. MacGregor said.

ART AND LITERATURE

In stressing the teaching of music in the schools, the speaker remarked on the hidden talent which is being brought to light and added "We cannot help but be conscious of the ever increasing demand for teachers of this art."

CHILDREN'S THEATRE

The children's theatre is becoming more popular throughout the province and in Vancouver splendid work has been done for several years. The performers are adults, but the plays are exclusively for children and the attendance is amazing.

"Whatever your organization may be, make it a factor in raising the standard of community entertainment by using dramas which have in them, something more than many words without meaning," Mrs. Ramsay continued. She urged the members to support the Drama Festival Association. "We need more than the three R's in preparation for good citizenship and good training for a practical life. Every child should be taught to use their God-given gifts intelligently, to create, to draw," the speaker said as she spoke in terms of esteem regarding the work being done in this respect by Miss Johnson in Charlottetown.

"Success does not come without effort or planning, but it comes to everyone who knows what he wants and understands the cost in effort and sacrifice and is willing to pay the price," Mrs. Ramsay concluded.

Other reports submitted including one on the Orphanages by Mrs. J. B. Fleming, Stanley Bridge, dealing chiefly with children's allowances; and by Mrs. MacKay, arts teacher at Vernon on the teaching of art to young children, in which she suggested the setting up of art classes at homes in some districts. As a token of appreciation of the work done, Mrs. MacKay was presented with a beautiful picture donated by Mrs. Harris of Charlottetown.

Mrs. Michael Doyle submitted a brief report on civil defence and made several valuable suggestions for co-operation with other organizations in the development of an all-over program.

The meeting was presided over by Mrs. Harold Laird of Kelvin Grove and opened with O Canada followed by Mary Stewart Collect in an entertaining number.

Construction Begins On Approaches To New Bridge Over Montague River

Construction began yesterday on the approaches to the new Montague bridge. For the present field stone is being hauled and hand-laid to form rip-rap around both ends of each approach.

The plan of the construction will make use of the present retaining walls. On the north side only will cement pillars be driven to support the new sidewalk. It is planned to remove the old curb, doweled present retaining wall, and tie-in the new concrete slab with steel. On the north side the new concrete road, 24 feet wide, will extend to approximately the entrance to the new road, and the new 5-foot sidewalk will extend to Johnston's cold storage. On the south side there will be a similar construction with rip-rap around the end of the abutment. Dowelling of the present retaining wall and tie-in with lisenhip.
