CIVIC MATTERS.

Is the letter that he has sent to the press, Councillor Tanton puts the best possible face upon the matter. We shall assume that in shirking the regular monthly meeting of the Council, he acted bona fide in accordance with what he believed to be the law of the corporation and the best interests of the city.

But a little investigation will convince him or any other reasonable man that he is entirely wrong. The law clearly provides that "there shall be in each year two monthly meetings of the City Council, to be held on the second Monday in each month."

But Councillor Tanton pleads that there is no business to transact. Even if this plea were good, respect for the law should have constrained the Councillor to hold and adjourn the regular monthly meeting for September, according to law.

It is said that a meeting of Council was held on the 31st ult., at which the usual business of the month was transacted, current financial affairs adjusted, and the necessary checks signed by the Mayor before his departure.

We refer to the recent wanderings of the council from the line of duty set forth in the law, not for the purpose of aggravating the ill-feeling which apparently exists, but rather to call the attention of citizens to a civic situation that ought to be remedied.
