



# DOWN THE BACK STRETCH

Mariners will be pleased to learn of the success Earle Avery is having with the 4-year-old pacer Royal Bank that Harley Harrison rode to a record of 2:12 1/2 last season in late fall owner A. Ryder of Moncton, sent him to Earle to be winter trained in Florida and last Monday night at Roosevelt Raceway he won in 2:06 1/2. He is the fastest Maritime bred performer of this season that we know of racing anywhere.

And on another trick a Maritime bred pacer is the Emerald, A. Renclois Park, Montreal, Yankee Dale by Playde's 2:01 1/2, owned by George M. Henderson, Montreal, that raced here last season, lowered his record from 2:14 3/4 taken at Charlottetown Sept. 20, driven by Cyril Smith to 2:12 and then to 2:11 1/2. In three starts he was three times first. He was then moved to three classes and was second on July 12th in the fast class. He has showed so well that he is expected to win 2:03 before the season is over. Through the kindness of Mr. Henderson we have received a photo from Richelle Park taken in the winner's circle there showing Mr. Henderson holding Yankee Dale and holding the shaft of the sulky. Bob McCloskey, manager of a branch of the Royal Bank in Montreal, formerly of Cambridge, P. E. I. also driver R. Cameron in the sulky.

Mr. McCloskey's branch of the Royal Bank is in the corner of St. Catherine and Bleury streets and recently the scene of a holdup. ## Hunters' Corner

This month has witnessed the greatest run of sea trout in the heavy weight class that has occurred over a period of years. Some years the trout run for the most part in the three quarter pound class but this season all classes have increased with particular emphasis on the big tackle basses. I have spotted sea green monsters that I am sure would pass the six-pound mark and I have had observers report that they saw trout close to three-feet long cruising in tidal estuaries. I know one seaward bridge (I have been sworn to secrecy on this one) that is not generally patronized by the angling fraternity where a regular "Jack Dempsey" lurks. He has stripped two anglers of their gear already and appears in the mood at any time to take on all comers.

The men who tangled with him (or her) now are now comers to the art of fly fishing but they took the count in less than 10 seconds of the 1st estuary. This trout is not to be confused with the Seal River Monster but I'll be getting around to him one of these days. This trout's tactics are pretty well patterned after the "Monsters" for when the barbed hook stings his jaw he opens the throttle wide and heads for the wide open spaces where the reel screeches and smokes for a matter of seconds and — ZING! the party is over for that day.

This trout could be a Steelhead. Rainbow trout that has gone to salt water, and this species is known as salmon on the Pacific coast. Rainbow trout have been escaping from Scales' Pond at Preetown at intervals over the past 15 years but this spring the dam partially went out and a portion of the rainbow population was carried stream in the rush of water. Early this month an R.C.A.F. Officer and his wife were fishing on the Dunk and one of them, I believe it was the lady, hooked and landed a Rainbow trout in the 6 pound bracket. Eye witnesses told me it took about a half hour or better to subdue this fighter. Time after time it leaped feet out of the water and fought as tenaciously as a salmon.

When informed of its point of origin the officer replied: "I'd like to be stationed in Summerside four years from now... Steelhead salmon fishing is going to outshine the trout on the Dunk River! The same situation is developing on the Cardigan River in Kings county and if local anglers have a yen to land a salt water rainbow of worthwhile poundage they'll have to carry more than the regular 75 feet of line on their reels.

## Tornado Henry Jordan Has Impressive Record

The cycle of great fighters grows wider with the years and Henry Jordan is one of those ring rarities that bob up too infrequently nowadays. Tornado Henry is a stocky rugged negro with the hands of a giant as boxing fans will discover when they watch him fight with Gil Edwards at the Forum on next Friday night.

It's going a long way to draw a comparison but he perhaps is best described as a little black "Jack Dempsey". For, like Dempsey, he weaves and bobs and hooks and works on the body until he pulls the other fellow's hands down. He isn't exactly a one-punch knockerout, but he hits hard enough and often rested for following them around. He never gives them a rest.

Jordan would be a favorite over the hard-hitting Gil Edwards. Charlie Smith, trainer of Jordan, says: "Henry will beat Edwards as sure as Rocky Marciano is heavyweight king, and I'm not so certain that Yvon Durille, the middle boss, can repel the little piece of flying ebony from Atlantic City."

Speaking to Ivan Doherty yesterday Smith said, "he couldn't understand Bobby Gleason giving the O.K. for Edwards to fight Jordan. Why Edwards has had only sixteen pro fights and against no big name fighters, Jordan has taken part in over 125 pro fights and against the best in the world. He defeated Tommy Beel when Beel was going good. He wanted to fight Sugar Ray Robinson for the world title in 1950. Robinson turned down a guarantee of \$20,000 offered by the Buffalo boxing promoters. Among the men Jordan has met and defeated are Johnny Greco, Harold Green, Bernard Duosen, Steve Belliose, Walter Cartier, Bobby Ruffin, Vic Delicotti, Norman Rubio, Ralph Zanella, Lester Felton, Johnny Cesarino, Sonny Home, Billy Erno, Doug Carter, Jimmy Doyle, Bert Lyell, Joe Curcio, Vince Larson, Joe Blackwood, Tommy Beel, Salva, Chaiky Wright, Cecil Hudson, Randy Sandy and Bobby Lloyd. Not too many of the world beaters can boast a better record."

Jordan is certainly a breath of fresh air after the run of Smiths, Medleys, Chocolates, Letourneaus. He has proved himself worth of the mantle of Dixon, Armstrong, Jordan claims his best showing
