Labor Union Has Meeting

The Laborers' International Union of North America held a meeting at the Basilica Recreational Centre Thursday night. An enthusiastic group of over 50 workers attended the primary meeting called by the United Brotherhood of Carpenters and Joiners to help set up a union for the unorganized labourers and other workers employed in the construction industry on Prince Edward Island.

Chaired by Ivan MacDougall, president of the Carpenters' Union, the meeting was first addressed by Merrill McAlduff and Claude Carroll of the district council. **CLERGY SUPPORT** — Rev. Father Alan MacDonald spoke of the responsibilities that unions must be willing to shoulder in return for the privileges they earn. Father MacDonald said that local clergymen of all faiths were anxious to find some way of correcting the distressing social conditions and inequalities that exist here, hidden sometimes, but still nonetheless existing here. Feature speakers of the evening were Rejean Charlebois, in the Atlantic Provinces, of the Laborers International Union of North America, and Mr. AT

Babineau of Moncton, N.B., Regional representative of the union. Mr. Charlebois compared building costs, wages and living expenses in Prince Edward Island with those of other parts of the Atlantic area and with those of Montreal. He particularly emphasized that no union can survive if its members are merely willing to pay their dues and then to leave its affairs in the hands of someone else to look after in a half-hearted manner.

Mr. Babineau told the meeting of unions recently organized in nearby areas, specifically in the Springhill, N.S., area, where new plans are growing up, and with the construction companies building these plants. Another meeting was called for Sunday, April 3, at 2.30 p.m.

to be held in the Basilica Recreation Centre. All workers present were asked to spread their own enthusiasm further, and to bring four or five other workers of all trades to this second meeting. If possible, a Branch of the Laborers International Union of North America will be set up at that time. The meeting adjourned, and refreshments were served by the staff of the centre, at which time more informal discussions took place between the union representatives and the workers present.
