IN KOREA (CP)—The \$8,000 question hereabouts is who walked away with the Patricia's 350-pound safe.

With the money and some important documents inside, the safe disappeared recently from the tent of Capt. Leslie Basham of Calgary, Quartermaster of the 3rd Battalion, Princess Patricia's Canadian Light Infantry.

Worried About Documents
The loss of the \$8,000 is nothing compared to that of the documents, which has senior officers at Canadian brigade and Commonwealth division headquarters worried.

Suspect Inside Job
An "inside job" is suspected since the heavy safe presumably was taken by someone with the run of the area and familiar with it.

Koreans Suspected
Suspensions are that Koreans rather than Canadians, removed the safe. A Canadian soldier would have trouble, it is felt, disposing of \$8,000 in scrip money, but a Korean could easily exchange it on the black market.

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Hope Persists That Armistice Will Be Signed
SEOUL (AP)—Nearly 1,000 anti-Communist Korean prisoners of war bolted to freedom Thursday night in a fresh gesture of defiance of the United Nations command less than 12 hours after some 25,000 POWs were released on orders of South Korean president Syngman Rhee.

TOKYO (AP)—Aviation's worst disaster killed every one of 129 United States servicemen aboard a giant Globemaster in a fiery crash near Tokyo Thursday.

Hours later, by searchlight, air force crews worked to recover the charred bodies.
To Hold Investigation
The U. S. Air Force said it would hold an investigation to try to discover the cause of the crash. Of the total aboard seven were crew members and the rest were airmen and army engineers attached to air bases returning to Korea from rest leave in Japan.

No Sign of Trouble
The air force said, however, there was nothing to indicate coming trouble on the fatal flight.

1,000 Rounded Up
About 1,000 of the 25,000 prisoners who broke from four camps in South Korea Thursday had been rounded up, but the task was complicated by 400 more who were loose in the Seoul area after breaking out early Friday from a camp near Incheon in a bloody clash with U. S. marines.

WINNIPEG (CP)—The Canadian army now is experimenting with an "anxiety-relaxing" drug called tulserol to quiet the fears of a paratrooper before he leaps from a plane.

Western Europe Stunned By Rhee's Action
LONDON (AP)—Western Europe has reacted in stunned surprise to President Syngman Rhee's release of 25,000 prisoners of war and voiced fears that the action might jeopardize chances for an early Korean truce.

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Nine German Cities Placed In State of Siege

BERLIN (AP)—The Soviet army executed a Berlin worker Thursday and resorted to military terror to beat down an anti-Communist revolt in East Germany.

Somewhere behind Red-flagged Brandenburg gate, on the border between East and West Berlin, a firing squad riddled the first German condemned to death by a Soviet drumhead court for Wednesday's workers' uprising against Red government.

Thousands Stay Home
But hundreds of thousands apparently stayed home today despite orders by the East German government to return to work immediately.

106-Year-Old Indian Woman Is Buried
VAL D'OR, Que. (CP)—Margaret Wahabé Papatie, 106-year-old widow of an Algonquin chief, was buried Thursday on a lonely point of Simon lake in northwest Quebec.

U. K. Gov't Cool Towards Trade Talks With China
LONDON (Reuters)—The British government poured cold water Thursday on proposals that it should begin trade talks with the Chinese Communists right away in order to get into the market quickly after a Korean truce.

HALIFAX (CP)—The Dominion Public Weather Office here says southerly winds continue to bring warm, very moist air to eastern Canada. At most inland localities skies were mainly cloudy Thursday and there were very widely scattered showers. Daytime temperatures were in the upper 70s and occasionally in the low 80s. Along the south coast of Nova Scotia and New Brunswick skies were mainly overcast and there was extensive fog with occasional drizzle. There is no indication of any change.

Regional forecasts:
Lower St. John river valley: Cloudy with widely scattered rain showers and coastal fog. Little change in temperature; light south winds. Low-high at Fredericton 62 and 80, Saint John 55 and 70.

Prince Edward Island, eastern N. B. counties, upper St. John river valley, Bay of Chaleur: Cloudy with widely scattered showers; continuing warm; light winds; low-high at Charlottetown 60 and 75, Moncton 62 and 75, Edmundston and Campbellton 63 and 80.

Bay of Fundy: Light southerly winds; widely scattered showers; visibility less than one-half mile in fog, improving occasionally to five miles in mist. Temperatures in the low 50s.
