PUBLISH THE AGREEMENT!

If the electors of Belfast and Murray Harbor are true to the interests of themselves and those who will come after them, they will not cast a vote for Messrs. McKinnon or Irving until they know the exact terms of the agreement (if any) made between the two Governments regarding the proposed Bridge over the Hillsborough. Enough is known to cause just alarm in the interest of the Island, and especially the part of it lying south of the Hillsborough. Is the Island's contribution to be based, as was contemplated by the local act, on a fair apportionment of the cost of the railway and vehicular traffic? Or is the Island to be compelled to pay an absolute sum of \$2,000 per annum forever, equal to a capital sum of \$400,000, without regard to the cost of the bridge as a whole or of the actual outlay upon it due to making adequate provision for pedestrian and vehicular traffic? What steps have the Provincial Government taken to ascertain for themselves the cost of the bridge, or what would be the fair proportion for the Province to bear? What are to be the provisions for maintenance, tolls etc.? Every one of these questions should be answered satisfactorily before the electors record their votes. Then, is the Island's contribution safeguarded by a provision, called for by the local law, that payment will not be made until the bridge has been constructed to the satisfaction of the Provincial Government? The fact that in such important particulars the Dominion Act completely ignores the local legislation furnishes the best grounds for apprehension that the Island may be sacrificed. The present Local Government is known to be completely subservient to the Ottawa administration. We do not believe there is a single man in the Local Government able enough or independent enough to stand up for the province. Some of their number have already been provided with offices and those that remain are anxiously awaiting their turns. The men in the Local Legislature who demanded intelligent action and a reasonable levy on our limited Provincial resources were the best friends of the bridge and of the people whose property it ought to be for all time to come. If this agreement is an improvident one, our children will suffer for our failure to do our duty at this important juncture. One word wrong in that agreement, one shade of meaning misunderstood or neglected to be made clear, may involve a severe tax on every farmer living on the south of the Hillsborough, forever, a and permanent depreciation of the value of every farm in Belfast and Murray Harbor.

History may repeat itself. We remember that they were Liberal politicians who held custody of the interests of the southern districts at the time branch railways were provided for Tignish and Souris, and Belfast and Murray Harbor sacrificed. We remember, too, that they were Liberal politicians who tried to get us to accept confederation on terms which were at least half a million of dollars less favorable to the Island than those obtained by the Conservatives. The Conservatives who defeated the Laird-Haythorne terms in 1873 were denounced as being enemies of Confederation just as the Conservatives are denounced today as enemies of the bridge because they demand that a good careful bargain be made in the interest of the Island, and particularly in the interests of the people living south of the Hillsborough.

Again, we say, let the agreement be published, if there is one in existence. In view of the fact that from two to three millions of dollars are due to the Island on public works, we protest against one dollar of the cost of the bridge, being imposed on Prince Edward Island except what experts may determine as a fair proportion for the use of the work for foot passengers, horses and carriages.

In arranging the terms of union with Canada, in 1873, the failure of our delegates to weigh one word thoroughly, lost the Island one seat in the House of Commons, for all time to come. In the British Columbia terms it was provided that the representation of that Province should be increased from time to time under the provisions of the British North America Act. In the P. E. Island terms it was stated that the representation should be readjusted from time to time, etc. The substitution of the word readjusted for increased was not noticed by the Island delegates, and the Island will forever pay the penalty of the oversight.

We mention this circumstance to show the great importance of care in making the present agreement. Let the public

see the agreement at once, if it is made. It is better and easier to have mistakes corrected now, than to have the matter a bone of contention between the Province and the Dominion for all time to come.

CHARLOTTETOWN MARKETS.

The street price of oats is 28c, and for potatoes the buyers are offering 16c. The bulk of the shipping is being made from the outports. There is a good supply of eggs, for which the buyers are giving 15c. Dressed pork ranges in price from 4 1/4 to 4 7/8, with considerable moving. The price of live hogs is from 3 1/4 to 4 1/4, according to quality.

The London Times comments upon the loyal public opinion of Canada and says:—This more than friendly attitude is evidently not dictated by any belief that Canadian interests are directly involved in the affairs of South Africa. Indeed, a belief that they are not so involved lay at the root of that lukewarmness with which a certain section of the Canadian public at first greeted the suggestion that the Dominion should volunteer to help in the enforcement of the Imperial Government's policy. The present and well-nigh universal feeling seems to be not only that the British quarrel is a righteous one, and not merely that Canadians would be unchivalrous to stand aside while we are struggling to confer on South Africa the just government and equal rights which Canada has long enjoyed, but that the British Empire is an organic whole, that the interests of one part are the interests of all, and that a blow struck at the South African branch of the Imperial family is a wound every other branch or that family is bound in its own interest to resist.
