In Memoriam

MRS. FRANCIS MCKENNA

—On February 6, 1955, there passed away suddenly after a brief illness at the Sacred Heart Home, Charlottetown, Mrs. Francis McKenna, formerly of Kinkora. Born Catherine Ann Hughes at Shamrock in December, 1870, she was the daughter of the late Owen Hughes and Catherine Trainor of Hope River. She spent her early years at home where she was educated at the district school. In 1894 she married Francis McKenna, and they established their home on a farm in Lower Freetown, where they are both fondly remembered as kind neighbours and loyal friends.

About 1925 they retired from active farm life and moved to the village of Kinkora where they had built a fine modern home. Mr. McKenna died in 1928, and shortly after that time Mrs. McKenna began to spend the winter annually at the Sacred Heart Home, Charlottetown. In more recent years she sold her home in Kinkora, and resided continually at the Sacred Heart Home.

Mrs. McKenna spent her long life in doing good to others, and her neighbours, relatives, and friends knew that where a helping hand was needed, her generous heart would quickly respond, whether it was in sickness, home or community need. Wherever she went, she made many friends who will remember her as one who held the ideals of Christian womanhood.

After her death on February sixth, her mortal remains were transferred to the home of her niece, Mrs. Henry Trainor, in Kinkora, from where the funeral was held on February eighth under the direction of Mr. P. A. Monaghan. Requiem High Mass was celebrated by Rev. Harold J. Croken, who also officiated at the burial services. The pallbearers were: George Hughes, Louis Trainor, Joseph L. Mulligan, W. P. McKenna and Linus Mulligan.

BASIC PINWHEEL DOUGH

Scald 1 1/2 cups milk
3/4 cup granulated sugar
2 1/2 teaspoons salt
1/4 cup shortening

Remove from heat and cool to lukewarm.

In the meantime, measure into a large bowl 1/4 cup lukewarm water
1 package granulated sugar
and stir until sugar is dissolved. Sprinkle with contents of 3 envelopes Fleischmann's Active Dry Yeast

Let stand 10 minutes, THEN stir well.

Stir in lukewarm milk mixture and 3 well-beaten eggs

4 1/2 cups once-sifted bread flour and beat until smooth and elastic; work in bread flour

Turn out on lightly-floured board and knead dough lightly until smooth and elastic. Place in a greased bowl and grease top of dough. Cover and set dough in warm place, free from draft, and let rise until doubled in bulk. Turn out dough on lightly-floured board and knead lightly until smooth. Divide into 4 equal portions and shape as follows:

1. **INDIVIDUAL CHELSEA TWIRLS**
Cream 1/4 cup butter or margarine and 1/2 cup brown sugar; divide into 12 greased cup muffins; beat gently, stirring often, until thick; cool. Roll out one portion of dough 16 by 10 inches, spread with rest of orange mixture, beginning at long side, roll up loosely; cut into 16 slices. Arrange in pan. Grease tops. Cover and let rise until doubled. Bake at 350°, 15 to 18 mins.

2. **ORANGE WHIRLS**
Boil together for 3 mins., stirring 1/2 cup butter or margarine, 1 tbsp. grated orange rind, 1/2 cup orange juice and 1/2 cup gran. sugar; cool. Spread half in greased 8-inch square pan. Roll out one portion of dough 16 by 10 inches, spread with rest of orange mixture, beginning at long side, roll up loosely; cut into 16 slices. Arrange in pan. Grease tops. Cover and let rise until doubled. Bake at 350°, about 30 mins.

3. **DATE EIGHTTS**
Combine 1/2 lb. cut-up dates, 1 cup water, 1/2 cup gran. sugar and 1 tbsp. butter or margarine; boil gently, stirring often, until thick; cool. Roll out one portion of dough into 12-inch square; spread half with roll of filling and roll up to centre. Cut into 12 slices. Place, well apart, on greased pan. Grease tops. Cover and let rise until doubled. Bake at 350°, 14 to 16 mins. Spread hot buns with icing.

4. **JAM RING**
Roll out one portion of dough 16 by 8 inches. Spread with 1/2 cup thick jam and cut into 8 strips, beginning at long side, roll up loosely. Twist dough from end to end; form into ring on greased pan. Grease top. Cover and let rise until doubled. Bake at 350° 25 to 30 mins. Spread hot ring with white icing; decorate top.
