LETTERS TO EDITOR.

Rome in the Church of England

To the Editor of the Guardian:

Sir,—Church members should ever be on their guard against persons gaining a footing and diverting the teaching of the grand old Church of England into other channels. The following will show how watchful we should be:

"The present position and attitude of the Ritualists recall some incidents which I heard related on a public platform in Salford, England, by the late Rev. C. D. Marston, then Rector of Castlemoor, Manchester, the present Canon Stowell, of Chorley, being in the chair. Mr. Marston said: 'A young man passed through Oxford University with me, took orders in the Church of England, married a wife, and got a living in due time. His wife died first and declared on her death-bed that she was dying a member of the Church of Rome. He also on his death-bed declared he was dying a member of the Church of Rome, and that he had a dispensation from the Pope to remain in the Church of England, and do the work of the Church of Rome.' Mr. Marston added: 'This is a case I could prove before a court of law, and therefore I mention it in public.' He went on to say: 'I knew a lady who became a convert, and the priest who received her into the Church of Rome advised her still to remain in the Church of England, and profess herself a strong Evangelical, that she might the better do the work of Rome. This case, also,' he added, 'I could prove before a court of law.' And then he added: 'If one man knows two such cases, how many may there not be throughout the length and breadth of the land?'

Are there any such men in our churches here? It behoves all true Protestants to be guarded against these secret enemies of our church. 'Not by their profession, but by their works you must find them out. It is a religious and public duty to expose them.

Gaelic Service in the Baptist Church.

The Rev. Malcolm Ross preached a Gaelic sermon Sunday at 4 o'clock p. m., in the Baptist church in this city, before a large, respectable and appreciative audience of over 200 persons—chiefly Gaelic speaking Highlanders. His text was Matt. 16, 26: 'What is a man profited if he shall gain the whole world and lose his own soul? or what shall a man give in exchange for his soul?' He dwelt chiefly on the incomparable value of the immortal soul, the imminent danger of losing so precious a gem, and pointed to the Cross of our Lord and Saviour Jesus Christ as the only means to secure the eternal salvation of the soul. In appealing to the audience to make all diligence to seek an interest in the peace-speaking blood, the words of the venerable father glowed with touching ardor and fervent desire for the salvation of his hearers. The service throughout was very impressive and instructive. Prof. D. J. McLeod and Mr. John Ross led the music, in which all present joined heartily. Similar services will be conducted in the same place, at the same hour, every Sabbath afternoon, at least during the summer months.—COM.
