## LETTERS TO THE EDITOR.

### Shall We Have a License Law?

SIR,—Am I to understand, from your

remarks in Monday's issue, that in the

event of the Scott Act being defeated at

the election in January next, the Legis-

lature will not pass a License Law? Your

reasoning is in this form: Because there

is a Liberal-Conservative majority in the

Lower House and a Grit majority in the

Upper House, it is hopeless to expect that

the Legislature will give the citizens of

Charlottetown a License Law regulating

the sale of liquor. Why there should be

any opposition to a bill having for its

object the better regulation of the liquor

traffic, I fail to understand; and what

reason our legislators will offer for their

refusal to pass such a law, I would like

to hear. Surely the men we send to Parlia-

ment will not be guilty of an act contrary

to all precedent and so detrimental to the

good government and morals of the people.

They will not, after they meet, I am sure,

leave the city one week without a License

Law. To suppose that they would is, in

my opinion, an absurdity. On the defeat

of the Scott Act, it is their duty as good,

intelligent men to enact a License Law.

Let there be no fear on this head. It is

all moonshine. Did you ever hear of any

country on the face of the civilized globe

permitting the sale of liquor with license?
