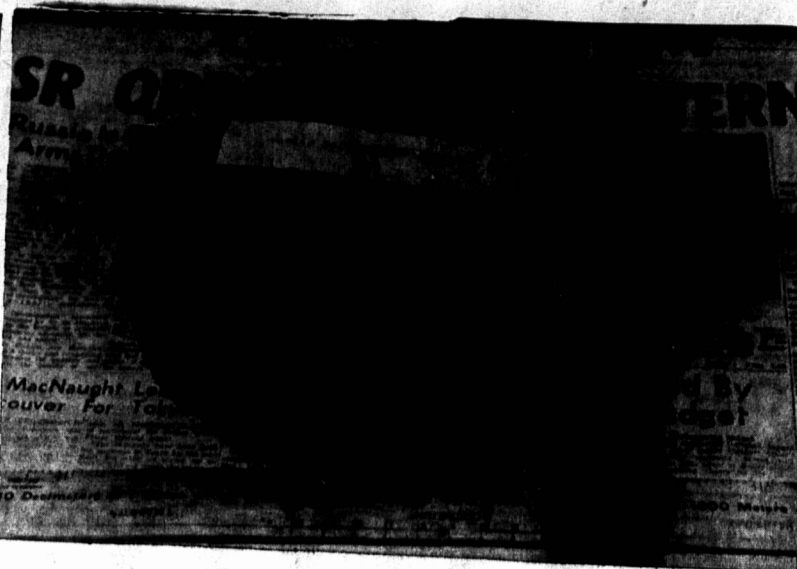

More Join Controversy Over Princess' Romance

By STANLEY GODFREY LONDON (AP) - Group Capt. Peter Townsend paid another visit to Princess Margaret at Clarence House Wednesday as The Times and a Methodist Church leader entered the controversy over whether she should marry the divorced 40-year-old commoner.

Townsend spent three hours at Margaret's home before she left for a dinner given by President Craveiro Lopes of Portugal at the Portuguese embassy.

Rev. Leslie Weather Head, president of the British Methodist conference, added his weight to arguments against the marriage. "If the state church (the Church of England) approved this marriage, it would break its own rules."

Even if Margaret renounced her right to the throne, her marriage would be a bad example to the nation, he said, adding: "Her example (would) not make it easier to uphold the ideal of Christian marriage in a land in which disregard is already too lightly regarded."

Former Ruhr Miner Now Established At Minto

By DON HOYT Canadian Press Staff Writer MINTO, N.B. (CP) - It takes only a few weeks for Hans Schatz, 46-year-old German immigrant, to assess the nation he is beginning to call home.

"Here you're a free man," he says. "You can do what you want. In a voice that will always bear a trace of the guttural accents of his homeland, he says:

"After four years I like it better here than in Germany. In Germany, everything's organized. You have to get permission even to move from one place to another."

FAMILY SAFE HERE The bond tying him to Canada is forged more deeply in his heart. Two of his five children bear brutal scars of the Second World War. His only daughter lost her hand and one of his sons was blinded in one eye when a shell screamed through their home during the Allied drive to cross the Rhine in the closing days of the war.

"That's how things started," Schatz said. "Things were very unsafe in Germany and we didn't know what was to come."

Schatz has found safety for his family in this dingy mining community where he practises the trade that earned him a position as an underground supervisor in one of the great coal mines of the Ruhr.

He would be even more content if he were certain that the future of his sons and daughter could be assured in other parts of Canada.

SON IN COLLEGE His second eldest son, 17-year-old Fritz, entered the University of New Brunswick this fall to study civil engineering. Education costs are being borne by an unidentified benefactor of whom Schatz speaks gratefully.

He hopes Hans, two years Fritz' senior, can find a job in the mines of Sudbury, Ont.

"There's not much hope here for a job," says his father. "In a couple of years up there maybe he'll be able to save enough to go to college, too."

His other children, Christel, 16; Kurt, 14, and Herbert, 12, are still in school.

Schatz arrived here in 1951 with little more than a few pennies jingling in his pocket. His entire family was with him.

"Before we left Germany we told the immigration authorities that 'either we all go together or we don't go at all.'"
