Word Hunting.

Some examples are worthy of admiration, not of imitation. A learned wit of the English tongue once tried to prove that the Greeks, the Romans, and the Jews spoke the language we now do in England. Some of his word-hunting I submit to the critical ability of your readers.

Achilles.—This hero was of a restless, unquiet nature, never giving himself any repose either in peace or war; and, therefore, as Guy of Warwick was called a *kill cow*, and another terrible man a *kill devil*, so this general was called a *kill ease*, or destroyer of ease; and at length, by corruption, Achilles.

Jupiter.—Statues and pictures of this heathen god, in foreign countries, resemble those of St. Peter, and are often taken one for the other. The reason is manifest, for, when the emperors had established Christianity, the heathens were afraid of acknowledging their heathen idols of the chief God, and pretended it was only a statue of the *Jew-Peter*. And thus the principal heathen god came to be called by the ancient Romans, with very little alteration, Jupiter.

Aristotle was a peripatetic philosopher, who used to instruct his scholars while he was walking. When the lads were come, he would arise to tell them what he thought proper; and was therefore called *arise to tell*. But succeeding ages, who understood not this etymology, have, by an absurd change, made it *Aristotle*.

Caesar was the greatest captain of the empire. The word ought to be spelt *Seizer*, because he seized on not only most of the known world, but even the liberties of his country.

Carthago was the most famous trading city in the world; where, in every street, there was many a *cart a going*, laden with merchandise. Hence the name.

Astrologer.—Among the ancients, fortune telling by the stars was a very beggarly trade. The professors lay upon straw, and their cabins were covered with the same material, whence every one who followed that mystery was called *astrow lodger*; but, in our new-fangled way of spelling, *Astrologer*.

Moses, the great leader, was in propriety of speech called *Moyses*, because he *moved the seas* down in the middle to make a path for the Israelites.

Love, is nothing else but *Eyes ache*; because the *Talmudists* report that he had a pain in his eyes, vide Ben Ganion and the Targum on Genesis.

A correspondent wishes to know the meaning of the exclamation *Halloo*. It is from the English verb *Halloo*, to call out, or shout to. The exclamation then, is simply, to arouse attention, or shout out. Your correspondent will remember that the word is always used for the purpose described.

The Dominion Revenue.

The cash receipts of the Finance Department at Ottawa for the month of November, 1879, amounted to a total of \$1,394,450.

The following were the receipts for the month of November, 1880:—

Showing an increase in November, 1880, of \$480,607.

The total increase in the first five months of the fiscal year 1880-81 is, therefore, \$3,059,968.

LATEST NEWS NOTES.

ENGLAND.

It is stated that Lord Beaconsfield will preside at a meeting of Conservatives of both houses, which it has been deemed necessary to hold in view of the early meeting of Parliament.

The English Government is weighted down with sinecures. The younger sons of lords and dukes are too gentlemanly to follow an honest business, and the government is too paternal to allow them to do so. The consequence is that there are a great many official positions like that which the Irishman defined as follows: "A sinecure? Sure it's a place where there's nothing to do and where a man gets well paid for doing it."

The English Council of Judges have resolved to recommend the abolition of the Chief Barony and Chief Justiceship of the Common Pleas.

ROME.

The Pope has recovered from his illness.

The Consistory is postponed till the middle of December.

The Pope has presented 5,000 francs to the sufferers by the earthquakes at Agram, Austria.

GREECE.

Latest advices state that Greece is eager for war; and notwithstanding the advice proffered by Germany to adopt moderate counsels, the Government is determined to continue military preparations. King George is present almost daily at the drill of the troops. The "Golos" of St. Petersburg, says that Russia will continue to support Greece morally, but cannot spend blood or money on the Greek cause.

PLENTY OF MONEY.

A Montreal despatch says, the large quantity of money seeking investment is unprecedented. Bankers see no possible chance for a change in the situation for some months. It is argued that the Government should float some of their bonds in the Montreal market, to replace some of the six per cent. about to lapse on the Montreal market.

UNITED STATES.

In September, October and three weeks of November there were over one thousand cases of diphtheria in New York, with the large proportion of four hundred and thirty-one deaths. In one week there were one hundred and fifty cases. The *New York Herald* says that Tammany Hall is the principal cause of the prevalence and progress in that city of this virulent and dreadful malady.

BRITISH COLUMBIA.

The British Columbia Parliament has been summoned to meet for the despatch of business on January 24.

Important discoveries of gold and silver quartz ledges have been made on the Nasse River, in the vicinity of Alaska. The specimens which have been shown here are very rich. Miners think that the ledges are located in British territory, but are very near the boundary line.

Prospectors on the Nasse River when the recent earthquake occurred represent the shock as very violent. Glaciers were split from the base to the summit, and great masses were cast into the valleys and creeks completely filling them up.

The Solomon Island Massacre.

SAN FRANCISCO, Dec. 1.—The *Sydney N. S. W. Herald* gives the following particulars of the massacre at Solomon Islands: The brigantine "Borealis," while seeking labor at Urn, near Malaya, was attacked by the natives who captured the vessel; of the crew five whites and one Fijian were killed. Capt. McKenzie and the boat's crew, who were ashore at the time, pulled a distance of forty miles to procure assistance and then returned and recaptured the vessel. Two native men, a woman and a boy, were captured and taken to Lemka. The natives of Rema completely wrecked the residence of Mrs. Williams at Sumatra who narrowly escaped with her life. The cutter "Idaho," Captain McMillan, was engaging labor at Lorid Sante, when the natives boarded her under the pretence of engaging for labor, and in the absence of the boat's crew on the shore, tomahawked the captain and native crew remaining on board, except two who obtained muskets and drove the murderers overboard. The boat's crew were attacked at the same time and were all killed but two, who reached the cutter and sailed away. The shooting of some of the natives about three months ago was one of the causes of the attack. The natives are armed with many modern weapons obtained from Queensland, and grow daily more dangerous and insolent.
