

Giants Blank Chicago 4-0; Cardinals Top Dodgers 3-2

San Francisco Giants made hay Friday behind strong-armed Johnny Antonelli and whipped Chicago Cubs 4-0 to pull within four percentage points of the National League leading Milwaukee Braves.

The Braves had a night game scheduled with Pittsburgh, one of the two contests on the NL night schedule. Cincinnati met Philadelphia in the other.

While the Giants were moving, Los Angeles Dodgers, also in the thick of the fight, dropped a 3-2 decision to St. Louis Cardinals.

In the only day games in the American League, Chicago White Sox edged Detroit Tigers, 6-5, on Al Smith's 10th inning home run and Cleveland Indians tied a tied back Kansas City A's, 8-4.

Boston was at Baltimore and Washington was at New York in American League night action. Coach Rudy York was in charge of the Red Sox, pending the arrival of new manager Bill Jurges.

Recently at St. Lambert's Legion's annual track and field championships, young Groom won the senior competition with a mark of 12 feet. Alfred is a most consistent vaulter and will give stellar performances every time he competes.

His excellent showings bring back memories of the feats of Charlottetown's Bill Halpenny who was grabbing laurels for the province just after the turn of the century.

Bill started his pole vaulting here on the Island and made a Maritime record in 1901. His jump that time was 11 ft. After that, Bill captured honor after honor. He won the Canadian championship seven times and the United States crown three times. These three victories came in 1908, 1909 and 1910.

At the world's indoor record of 11 ft. 8 inches. At the Olympics held at Stockholm, Sweden in 1912, Halpenny was third. The pole broke on that occasion and Bill was defeated a time. However, when he returned to Canada he defeated his two Olympic conquerors, Babcock and Wright, with a jump of 12 feet.

Bill is residing in Charlottetown and is still a keen follower of all branches of sport. However, he has had a particular interest in the doings of Alfred Groom.

After all, Groom is doing the thing that Halpenny loved best. And the Summerside lad is making a right smart job of it too.

\$100,000 Price Tag Is Put On Wimbledon Champion

WIMBLEDON, England (AP)—Peruvian Alex Olmedo added the famed Wimbledon championship to his growing list of tennis honors Friday and became a \$100,000 target of professional promoters.

The copper-skinned stylist crushed Australia's Rod Laver in a fast-paced 72-minute final 6-4, 6-3, 6-4.

Then, after receiving the silver trophy from the hands of the Duchess of Kent, the 23-year-old son of an Arquipa court caretaker ducked questions about his professional plans.

"I am thinking now only of playing for the U.S. Davis Cup team," he said. "I would like to come back to Wimbledon next year."

Today Darlene Hard of Montebello, Calif., and 19-year-old Maria Bueno of Brazil play for the women's championship. Althea Gibson won the last two years and America has held the title since 1938.

NO. 1 AMATEUR
In winning Wimbledon, the handsome young Peruvian establishes himself as the No. 1 amateur in the world. He now has won two major championships—the Australian and Wimbledon.

A capacity crowd of 13,000, including the Duchess of Kent and Princess Margaret, saw the partition completely dominate the final match with Laver, a tenacious unseeded player #20.

Olmedo, dropping only two points in his first three-service games, raced to a quick 5-1 lead in the opening set, relaxed momentarily and finally won the set with a display of serving power in the 10th game.

He lost his service only once, in the eighth game of the first set. He cracked Laver's high-kicking delivery twice in the first set, twice in the second and once in the third.

The five-foot, six-inch Laver was the third unseeded player ever to reach the Wimbledon final. The others were Texas' Wilmer Allison in 1930 and Kurt Nielsen of Denmark in 1953 and 1955. No unseeded player ever won.

Game time has been set at 2:30. "Duck" Lightizer has been named to start for the Abbies while Lefty Dunn is the likely starter for the Legion line.

The game is billed as a practice game for both teams and it is likely a number of pitchers will see action on each side.

Higgins Bounced Jurges Is Hired

BOSTON (AP)—Mike Higgins, who played his last active ball game for the Red Sox, was fired Friday as manager and was succeeded by Billy Jurges, onetime scrappy infielder and now a Washington Senators coach.

Tom Yawkey, Sox owner and president, expressed regret for dismissing Higgins.

"It was a tough thing to call him and tell him that a change at this time might be beneficial to the ball club," Yawkey told sports-writers.

The Sox Friday morning were in eighth place, 9 1/2 games out of first.

This is Higgins' fourth season as Sox manager. Under him the club finished fourth twice and third twice.

Jurges, 51, was flying to New York to join the Senators when the announcement was made.

As he prepared to repack his bags he told writers "I'm delighted. It's a terrific break."

It will be the aggressive Jurges' first crack at a managerial job in the majors. He finished fifth with Cedar Rapids in the Three-I League in 1950 and second with Hagerstown in the Piedmont League in 1953.

Rudy York, who played first base in 1946 for the Sox when Higgins was the third baseman, will handle the club until Jurges takes over today in Baltimore.

Jurges was a peppery infielder with Chicago Cubs and New York Giants for 17 years. At Chicago he played in one of baseball's best fields — with Charlie Grimm at first, Billy Herman at second and Stan Hack at third.

Gary, an all-around athlete who plays golf on a worldwide basis, succeeds Australia's Peter Thomson as champion and also as the youngest modern winner. Thomson was 24 when he won the first of his four titles in 1954. Player won't reach that age until Nov. 1.

The young South African pro had rounds of 75-71-70-68 over the windswept par 36-36-72 Muirfield links. Wind and rain were the obstacles during the first two rounds. It was windy but clear for Friday's last two rounds.

Player is the youngest British Open champion since Scotland's fabled Tom Morris Jr., who was only 18 when he won in 1868. He's the youngest of all since the competition was extended to 72 holes in 1892.
