**NEW SPRING HATS.**—For Spring Styles in Ladies' Hats go to J. B. McDonald's.

**THE Queen** has given £200 towards the Academy of Arts in Ottawa city.

The mails crossed to Cape Tormentine today (Monday), but did not return.

**SAMUEL ALLINGTON**, conductor of the Intercolonial Railway, fell off a train near St. John, N. B., to-day, and was killed.

We learn that a Post Office is to be established at Mill Cove. Mr. William McGrath is Postmaster.

**THE Czar** has written to the German Emperor, assuring him of his friendship towards Germany.

**CAPTAIN WEBB**, the well known swimmer, has succeeded in the feat of swimming 60 hours uninterruptedly.

No signs of the *Northern Light's* arrival yet. Vast quantities of ice are visible from Georgetown, and the Straits are reported to be packed.

The funeral of Mrs. Dawson this afternoon was a very large one. At Prince Street Methodist Church a very affecting service was conducted by the Rev. Mr. Cowperthwaite and the Rev. Mr. Campbell.

An excellent entertainment is advertised to take place in the "Auld Kirk" on Thursday evening. It will consist of Vocal and Instrumental Music, etc. Get a programme, and don't fail to attend.

**EIGHT THOUSAND** three hundred emigrants landed in New York in February, against 2,800 in February last year, and 148,000 during the year ending February 29, against 82,000 the previous year.

**CHARLES STEWART PARNELL**, before his departure from New York for Ireland, said he visited sixty-two American cities, and the cause he represents was enthusiastically received; that \$200,000 had been subscribed, of which \$120,000 has been remitted to Ireland.

It is understood, says the *Standard*, that the Royal Commission on agricultural depression in Great Britain have unanimously approved of the principle of a scheme for the purchase by the Government out of the Irish Church Surplus Fund of Irish waste lands, which are to be allocated among local farmers on certain conditions of tenure and improvement.

**WM. HENNESSY** who, one month ago, was committed to jail for 30 days, appeared before the Stipendiary Magistrate this morning, charged by Wm. Weeks, Esq., with the larceny of one pair of boot uppers. Mr. Weeks' testimony was taken, after which the evidence of Mrs. McNeill, proprietress of the Revere House, and Mr. Theo. L. Chappelle were severally given, charging Hennessy with the theft of various articles. The prisoner was remanded until 10 o'clock to-morrow.

**MR. JOHN DUNN**, the resident British representative on the Zulu frontier, is already beginning to usurp his authority, and very grave fears are entertained by the colonists that his dogmatic and cruel influences may lead to endless complications, possibly of a trivial nature at first, but which will, such is the unvarying opinion, culminate into very grave and serious results.

**MR. BECHARD** has a bill before the House of Commons which proposes to reduce the salaries of the principal officers of the Dominion to the following amounts:—Governor-General, on and after the expiration of the present incumbent's term, \$35,000; members of the Privy Council who are also members of the Cabinet, \$5,000 each; Lieutenant-Governors of Ontario and Quebec, \$6,000 each; Lieutenant-Governors of the remaining Provinces and territories, \$5,000 each; Senators, for session of over thirty days, \$600, or six dollars for each day's attendance during a session of thirty days or less; do. for members of Parliament. Speakers of the Senate and Commons, \$2,300.

ON Saturday the 13th inst., at 7.30 o'clock, p. m., a number of teachers and others interested in Education, met in the Normal School building, for the purpose of organizing an Educational Association. D. Montgomery, Esq., Chief Superintendent of Education, occupied the Chair. Enthusiastic addresses, setting forth the desirability of an Educational Association, and also the subject to be aimed at by it, were delivered by D. Leeming, Rev. K. McLennan, Prof. Caven. Prof. Anderson, Hon. A. A. McDonald, A. B. McKenzie, Esq., Lemuel Miller, Esq., Wm. Heard, Esq., and P. R. Bowers, Esq. The next meeting of the Association will be held on Saturday, the 20th inst., at 7.30 o'clock, p. m. All interested in education and desirous of promoting its interests are invited to attend.

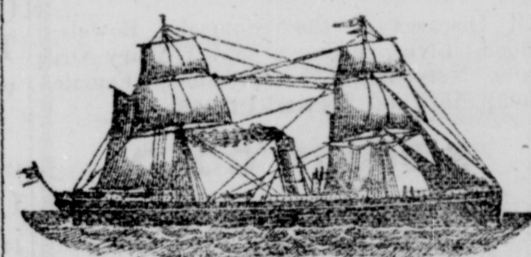
