MAJOR GENERAL Selby Smyth arrived on Saturday evening in the steamer Miramichi. On arrival he was received by a guard of honor under command of Major Morris and Captain Longworth. The General is a guest of His Honor the Lieutenant Governor. He will commence inspecting the militia early this week.

BRUTAL ASSAULT.—On Saturday night about 11 o'clock, a young man apparently the worse of liquor was staggering down Queen Street. When opposite T. O'Connell's corner, he was pounced upon by two rough-looking individuals, who knocked him down, kicked him for a few minutes, and left him lying on the street,—the blood from his wounds almost choking him.

At the Stipendiary Magistrate's Court, Saturday morning, John Gill, drunk and incapable, was fined \$3 or 14 days; John Whitty, on complaint of Judge Alley, for trespass, fined \$2 and costs; Geo. Ryan, for selling liquor without license, fined \$16 and costs; Michael Purcell, Frank McCarthy, James Goodman, Malcolm McKinnon and James Kelly, for burglary, were remanded till to-day.

WAR DESPATCHES.

(Special Dispatch to Daily Examiner.)

LONDON, August 4.

The Turks are supported by more Egyptian troops.

The Bulgarians, since the Russian defeat, are fleeing to escape Turkish vengeance.

Hobart Pasha commands the entire Turkish fleet in the Black Sea, consisting of twenty ships.

In the Commons, the South African Bill was read a third time. Obstruction to it is stamped out.

GOLD.

NEW YORK, Aug. Gold, 105 1/2.

ERZERUM, Aug 2.

The Russian centre, which has been reinforced by 14 battalions of infantry and three field batteries, has resumed the offensive. There has been continuous fighting on advance lines before Kars, and General Tergukosoff has also been reinforced by five battalions of infantry, one battery and regiment of Dragons. The Russian right is marching on Penek.

ATHENS, Aug. 3.

The Greek Foreign Minister sent a despatch to Minister at Constantinople instructing him to verify alleged massacre of Kavoon, and if the victims are Greeks to demand full redress, indemnity, and efficacious guarantee for the security of Christians.

LONDON, Aug. 3.

Reports that negotiations have been opened for alliance between Greece and Servia are untrue.

An Athens despatch to the "Times" says that 16,000 rifles have arrived from Austria. War is considered probable.

The Vienna political correspondence states that Sweden, in view of political situation, contemplates some military preparation.

Col. Wellesley, British attache, has been summoned home. It is stated his relations with Russian headquarters have recently been most cordial.

Midhat Pasha is expected at Paris on Monday.

New York, Aug. 3.

At the Lucy Furnace Company's Works Pittsburgh, this morning, seven men were engaged in lining a furnace, and working on a scaffold supported by ropes. These took fire from the furnace. The scaffold fell, precipitating the men into the furnace. Two were taken out dead, and five are not expected to recover.

There is no particular change on the Delaware, Lackawanna and Western Railroads. Lawlessness prevails, which the military must quell.

A Kingston dispatch says the only way to get trains through is with military to guard the tracks from being obstructed and wires cut at night.

At Scranton there is no change. The feeling is very bitter, and no resumption of work is possible for some days.

It is now thought some eight or ten girls perished at Cincinnati. The fire originated in a cellar, and an attempt was made to extinguish it without the aid of the Fire Department, when it attained such headway that the employees were obliged to escape from the roof, in which some succeeded. Part of the operatives who lost their lives were males.

CITY COUNCIL.

City Council met on Saturday morning. Present—His Worship the Mayor, His Honor the Recorder, Councillors Murphy, Byrne, Smith, Hooper, Morris, Harris, Hertz, Millner.

Read a copy of the agreement with John C. Keefe for Euston Street drain.

Moved by Councillor Hooper, seconded by Councillor Byrne, that \$200 be advanced to J. C. Keefe for the contract on Euston Street drain.

Schedule of City Accounts being presented, Councillor Smith, directed attention to the cost of spikes, and stated that they could be provided at less rates than charged in the Accounts presented.

COUNCILLOR MURPHY referred to the question of voting at the Civic Elections by appeals. Said he acted once under instructions from the late Recorder Lawson, and received votes under appeals. He complained that now if persons were compelled to have the Assessment Receipts before voting they would be prevented from prosecuting their appeals.

The Recorder explained the impropriety of instructing Returning Officers in their conduct at elections. He then read 9th Sec. of Act Vic. Cap.

COUNCILLOR MURPHY said he would like to see every man once rated to have the right to vote.

COUNCILLOR MILLNER thought it was only fair to all candidates to insist on carrying out the law by having taxes paid before voting.

COUNCILLOR HOOPER recommended the issue of debentures to Mr. James Butcher in payment for his work.

Moved by Councillor Harris, seconded by Councillor Currie, that Mr. Butcher's account be paid by debentures.

On motion of Councillor Harris, seconded by Councillor Byrne, it was ordered that all accounts now on the table, as per schedule and certified by Finance Committee, be paid—Carried.

Adjourned till Monday evening at 7 o'clock.
