

Regards Mission To Canada As Aiding Commonwealth Ties

AUCKLAND (CP) — There is "no more important task in the Commonwealth today than in strengthening relations between the four foundation members," says Sir Leon Gotz, newly nominated New Zealand high commissioner to Canada.

"I am convinced we older Commonwealth countries must come closer together and I regard my mission to Canada as an opportunity to make a contribution to that end," Sir Leon said in an interview.

"Only if the white Commonwealth members, who are the 'haves,' devise effective methods of helping the 'have-nots' with knowledge and experience, can the Commonwealth play its full part in the world."

Sir Leon says he hopes to learn much of value to New Zealand in Canada — particularly in industrial development and how to cope with an immigration influx as Canada has done.

"I hope to travel extensively and see as much of the country as possible. I have been to Canada before, but not to live. There are a good many similarities between our countries, but differences too. Relations have always been warm and friendly, but I think contacts can be made closer."

a varied career he learned to speak a round dozen languages.

Sir Leon's career took him, among other places, to Malaya, where he was a rubber planter for 12 years. He served during the First World War with the Malaya States Rifles and the Royal Air Force. He was wounded, losing an eye and part of an arm. He wears an eye patch which became a distinctive part of the political scene during his years in Parliament.

Sir Leon saw further tropical service in the Pacific island group of Samoa, where he was general manager of the New Zealand Reparation Estates, formed from German properties taken over when New Zealand occupied Samoa during the First World War, and administered for the benefit of the islands.

Subsequently, he was engaged in business in New Zealand, and then from 1948 he served as a member of Parliament, the last three years until 1963 as minister of internal affairs, island territories and civil defence.

He is widely known in New Zealand for his sponsorship, as minister of internal affairs, of the national lottery, the Golden Kiwi, which has retained in New Zealand a great deal of money which previously filtered abroad to Australian and other overseas lotteries.

Sir Leon was named a knight commander of the Royal Victorian Order in 1963 after he acted as minister in attendance on the Queen during her tour of New Zealand.

Sir Leon and Lady Gotz plan to leave New Zealand for Canada Feb. 23.

WEST OF GREAT GEORGE STREET — The Second Polling Division shall comprise all that portion of Ward Number One, in the City of Charlottetown, situate West of Great George Street, and the Poll shall be held at or near Labourers' Protective Union Hall, being number 48 Water Street.

WARD TWO

EAST OF GREAT GEORGE STREET—The Third Polling Division shall comprise all that portion of Ward Number Two, in the City of Charlottetown, situate East of Great George Street, and the Poll shall be held at or near the Basilica Recreation Centre, being number 200 Richmond Street.

WEST OF GREAT GEORGE STREET—The Fourth Polling Division shall comprise all that portion of Ward Number Two, in the City of Charlottetown, situate West of Great George Street, and the Poll shall be held at or near the Capital Credit Union Office, being number 86 Queen Street.

WARD FIVE EAST

WEST OF GREAT GEORGE STREET AND EAST OF QUEEN STREET — The Eleventh Polling Division shall comprise all that portion of Ward Five in Charlottetown, West of Great George Street and Malpeque Road and East of Queen Street, and the Poll shall be held at or near Batt and MacRae's, being on the north-east corner of Upper Queen and Euston Streets.

WARD FIVE WEST A
