A Letter from the Country.

To the Editor of the Examiner.

SIR,—While it must be admitted that the chief place of interest at present to politicians, at least, is the city, where the assembled wisdom is supposed to be busy making laws conducive to the common weal, I take it for granted that an item or two from the country will prove as welcome as good news generally is. The first thing I have to chronicle is the disappearance of winter and the near approach of spring. Birds are returning from their winter quarters. The robins have arrived. Several have been seen within the last few days. Since the strong south-westerly winds of last week, no ice is to be seen along the North Side. It is believed it has been blown round the Cape into the Gulf. If so, the present spring will likely be the earliest for the last thirty years. The ice on our rivers is also rapidly breaking up; the fields are nearly bare, and the roads will soon be ready again for wheels. Along the South Side the coast is quite clear. This is a fact worth noting by the Winter Steam Committee now sitting at Ottawa. Be it known to them and everybody else interested in the subject that at present writing the "Northern Light," if she were to run to Souris, would find no difficulty whatever in coming straight to Souris Breakwater, as there is no ice in the Bay outside that work, and, in a day or two at most, the harbor will be as clear of ice almost as in midsummer. Those engaged in the fisheries are busy preparing for the spring's fishing. As there is every likelihood of fish commanding high prices in the markets the coming season, a great many are making extensive preparations for a large catch, and it is sincerely hoped that their efforts may bring them satisfactory results. A large number of farmers in this section of the country engage more or less in the fishing business, and it is no unusual occurrence to see them foot up in the fall of the year a much larger sum from their summer's fishery than from the products of the farm. Notwithstanding the short crops last year, owing chiefly to the lateness of the spring, the farmers are by no means disheartened. They have been mud digging and lime burning on a more extensive scale than ever before. At no distant day I hope to see cheese factories, and other like establishments started in this part of the country. There is no doubt but the farmers here are as intelligent, industrious and progressive, as in any other part of the Island. All I need add is to wish them every success. FISHERMAN.

Meeting of Presbytery.

The Presbytery of P. E. I. met in Zion Church on 27th inst. There were present eleven ministers and two elders.

Rev. S. C. Gunn accepted the call to Springside, Nova Scotia. In this decision the Presbytery concurred, and agreed to transfer Mr. Gunn to the Presbytery of Trent to be inducted into his new field of labor. Rev. Mr. Grant was appointed to preach in St. Peter's on 1st April, declare the congregation vacant, and convey to them the sympathy of Presbytery, and the hope that they may soon obtain a worthy successor to their late esteemed minister. Mr. Gunn, and his amiable partner, who enjoy the love and esteem of the whole congregation, will be long and fondly remembered in St. Peter's, and will bear with them to their new home, the good wishes of the whole Presbytery, and of the numerous friends throughout the island, to whom they were greatly endeared by their many excellent qualities.

Rev. Messrs. McLennan, Grant, and the Clerk, were appointed a committee to prepare a suitable minute in reference to Mr. Gunn. Mr. Grant was appointed interim moderator of the session of St. Peter's, and Mr. Cameron interim moderator of the session of Cardigan and Dundas. Rev. A. F. Carr, M. A., was chosen moderator of Presbytery.

A committee consisting of Messrs. Allen, McLellan, McLeod, McKay, Archibald, McMillan, McNeill and Isaac Thompson, Esq., was appointed to enquire into the present condition of the Prince Street congregation, collect all needful information being in the existence of a third Presbyterian congregation in this city, and to report at next meeting of Presbytery, with the view of arriving at such a conclusion as will be agreeable to all parties interested and be conducive to the best interests of the Church.

The services of Messrs. Leitch, Bruce and Currie, students from Montreal have been engaged for the summer months, and Messrs. McLellan, McLellan, McKay, and the Clerk authorized to give them appointments on their arrival. The clerk was instructed to apply to the H. M. Board for two probationers, and for leave to employ Mr. Myers, of Princeton, New Jersey. Rev. J. G. Cameron was appointed to preach for Mr. Frame on 2nd Sabbath April, and Rev. J. Allan, on 3rd Sabbath April. Mr. Carr was appointed to preach one Sabbath in Tignish during April. Mr. Stewart was appointed to preach in St. Peter's Road, and Brackley Point Road, on the 1st Sabbath May.

Rev. John McLeod of Strathalbyn, obtained leave of absence from the congregation for three months. The next regular meeting of Presbytery will be held in Summerside, on 1st May, at 11 o'clock a. m.

DOMINION PARLIAMENT

NOTES OF THE SESSION.

STEAMER TO THE WEST INDIES.

On the afternoon of the 23rd instant, Senator Howland, Messrs. Brecken, McDonald, and other gentlemen interested, had an interview with the Finance Minister, Sir S. L. Tilley, to urge on his attention the advantages to the Lower Provinces, and more particularly to P. E. Island, of Steam Communication with the West Indies. The Minister stated that the matter of increasing and extending the trade with the West Indies had, to some extent, been under the consideration of the Cabinet, and the Government were disposed to consider favorably any effort to facilitate and increase the volume of trade in that direction.

ATTRACTIONS OF BRITISH COLUMBIA.

Mr. Shakespeare, one of the representatives of the Western Province, in an interview with a Mail reporter, stated that "the climate is all that can be desired, especially Vancouver Island. The winters are very mild and the summers are delightful; in fact it is a second paradise."

"What inducements do you offer to immigrants?"

"Well, I suppose, plenty of work and good wages would be called inducements. I will give you the rate of wages paid, so that the public may judge:—Blacksmiths get \$3 to \$3.50 a day; bricklayers, \$4 to \$5; carpenters, \$2.50 to \$3.50; boiler-makers, \$3 to \$3.50; cabinet-makers, \$3; iron moulders, \$3 to \$3.50; cigarmakers, from \$11 to \$13 per thousand; helpers in foundries, \$2 to \$2.50 a day; laborers, \$1.75 to \$2; machinists, \$3 to \$3.50; plasterers, \$4 to \$4.50; longshoremen, 50c. an hour; printers, 45c. a thousand; stonecutters, \$4 to \$5 a day; tailors, \$2 to \$3; painters, \$3; masons, \$4 to \$5; salesmen stores, \$60 to \$100 a month; shoemakers, \$2.50 to \$4 a day; wood-turners, \$3 a day; fishermen employed in salmon canneries, \$50 to \$60 a month. For female household help we pay \$10 and \$12 a month, without asking them to wash, and for general household helpers we pay \$12 to \$20 a month. If a hundred women were to enter Victoria to-morrow, they would find situations in a day."

"What facilities do you offer for acquiring land?"

"Well, the area for cultivation is not extensive, though larger perhaps than is generally supposed. Vancouver Island is estimated to contain 300,000 acres, while along the Lower Fraser there are about 175,000 acres of great fertility. Much, of course, has been taken up. There is no difficulty, however, in obtaining land for \$1 an acre, the conditions being that the settler must within thirty days after receiving notice enter into actual occupation of the land personally or by his family or agent, and neither Chinese nor Indians are allowed to act in the latter capacity. A great

DRAWBACK TO THE SETTLEMENT OF THE COUNTRY,

which has existed for a number of years, arises from the fact that the Government received a forty mile belt of land for railway purposes, and until that reserve is lifted British Columbia is not a place for any large number of farmers to emigrate to. I am glad to say, however, that the Government informed me the other day that those lands will be thrown open at once, and if that be the case, those who are on the spot at the time will stand the best chance of getting good places. Farm hands get from \$20 to \$30 per month, with board, and a few could find immediate employment. In speaking of the province, it must be remembered that we are not speaking of an insignificant tract of land, the computed area being 350,000 square miles. The country has been decryed by politicians and others, principally, I believe, because they were ignorant of its vast resources. That feeling, I am happy to say, is fast disappearing, the people are beginning to think and act for themselves. British Columbia is destined to pour more money into the Treasury than any other province in the Dominion, on account of her varied resources. She has her agriculture products, vast coal beds, superior to any on the Pacific coast, and mountains of iron, copper, silver, gold, &c. Her fisheries are large and unsurpassed, increasing in value every year. To the sportsman we offer great attractions in all parts of the province, ducks, grouse, geese, deer, mountain goat and sheep, bears, &c., being numerous. Victoria, the capital, has a population of 8,000. Its harbor is frequently thronged with shipping. It has direct mail communication with San Francisco three times a month, and three times a week with Puget Sound. The city possesses excellent macadamized roads, and her manufacturing establishments are numerous. They include boat-building, brush, cigar, biscuit, boiler, flour, candy, furniture, piano, and glove-making establishments, saw mills, soap works, fish and door factories, coffee and spice mills, foundries, etc. Hotel accommodation is first-class and reasonable. At Esquimalt, four miles from Victoria, which has the best harbor on the Pacific Coast, and which is to be the terminus of the Canadian Pacific railway, a dry-dock is being built by the Government which will give employment to 200 men.
