## Second Mall Phase Begins

Royalty Mall Limited announced yesterday the commencement of the second phase of its shopping center on Upper Queen and Pond streets in Charlottetown.

This phase consists of the construction of a 30,000 square foot junior department store which will be placed on a long term lease to Sledman's division of MacLeod-Stedman Ltd.

It was also announced that Sobeys' store will construct a 10,000 square foot supermarket on adjoining land fronting on Elm Ave.

Royalty Mall and the Sobeys Food Market will operate as one shopping center under separate ownerships. Opening date for these stores is expected to be in the late summer of 1966.

The entire complex, when completed, will comprise 86,000 square feet of store space consisting of two food markets; a junior department store, auto supply store, a provincial liquor commission store, a bank, ladies wear, mens wear, shoe store, drug store and other service stores.

At the time of the announcement, it was stated that less than 9,000 square feet of retail space remains to be leased.

## Brothers Operate Service Station

**GEORGETOWN** - The service station on the corner of Kent and Grafton Streets, until recently operated by Charles A. McConnell, has been taken over by Yvon Bouchard and Maurice Bouchard, who in addition to operating the service station will also continue a fuel oil distribution service in this area.

## Jamaica Voices Criticism Of Great Powers Attitude

Jamaica has criticized the attitude taken by members of the United Nations Security Council, especially the great powers, towards the issues brought before this principal UN peacekeeping organ.

Egerton Richardson, chief Jamaican delegate, said that "other considerations than its common interest" seems to motivate the council's members.

"Every member of the council seems to arrive at the table with some commitment, psychological or political, which outweighs or precedes the interests of the people who are the victims of the current act of aggression," he said.

Anti-communism, opposition to a national liberation movement, attachment to a regional alliance, friendship for an absent state or national pride and prestige have all been used to prevent the council from taking effective action, he said.

Richardson, addressing the UN General Assembly's special political committee, struck at the council's rule of unanimity which gives the right to veto to the five permanent members - the United States, Russia, Britain, France and China - of the necessity of making compromises.

This rule has prevented the council from acting in response to Malaysia's charge of aggression and foreign troops still are able to remain on Dominican soil "against the wishes of the population," Richardson said.

The veto is the "antithesis of compromise," he said.

**SHOULD RETAIN POWERS**  
This is why it is so important to the smaller powers that the General Assembly should retain residual powers for the mounting of peacekeeping operations, he said.

"For us, if for no one else, it is a matter of life or death that effective recourse to the opinion of the general membership should always remain available," he Jamaican said.

"In the assembly no single member has special means of asserting its own will. So there is a greater necessity to compromise. Hence it is likely that political expediency which reflects more accurately the common interest.

"In the assembly, with its preponderance of minor states, there is a greater likelihood that the interests of the common people will prevail in the decisions we arrive at."

## Rough Play, Violence Mar British Soccer

**LONDON (CP)** - British soccer's reputation has taken a nosedive this season because of rough play on the field and violence among spectators.

Almost every week headlines report the latest trouble at English League games and sports writers issue dire warnings of the depths to which professional soccer may fall if something isn't done.

Across the country groups of disgruntled fans vent their displeasure by bombarding players with bottles, beer cans or anything that comes to hand - including a dead hand grenade at one recent match.

Hooligans cause damage to property and dozens are fined for smashing windows and wrecking the fittings of excursion trains taking fans to out-of-town matches.

Officials admit the dangerous element is a minority but emphasize that these few are nevertheless causing harm to British soccer.

Proposals to solve the problem have come from many quarters and there have been many demands for the Football Association to take a strong line.

The FA has formulated a plan which will be put into effect as soon as it can get co-operation from the home office; the government department responsible for law enforcement.

The soccer authorities want more police and club officials in the crowds to stop trouble before it spreads. They also want the home office to give judges the power to impose bigger fines on rowdies who are convicted.
