Farmer's League Champs Given Banquet On Friday

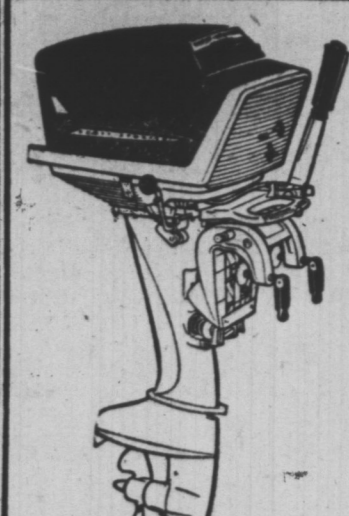
