The Sultan positively objected to the amount of the indemnity and to guarantees. He pleaded inability to meet the Spanish demands. General Campos gave him time to consider the matter. It is supposed the Sultan hopes to procure European mediation. General Campos' orders forbid him accepting any of the kind."

St. Petersburg, Feb. 8.—The Czar is going to the Crimea at the end of February in order to complete his recovery to health.

LONDON, Feb. 8.—A Berne correspondent of the Central News says: The present friction between Switzerland and Italy arose from the latter's desire as to the payment of customs duties in gold. This desire of the latter was opposed by the federal council, which eventually demanded the withdrawal of the decree as contrary to the existing commercial treaty between the countries, otherwise the council advanced arbitration. Italy declined. The council is now discussing what course it shall pursue.

Rome, Feb. 8.—R. M. Ballantyne, the celebrated writer of stories and adventure, died here today.

BROCKTON, Mass., Feb. 8.—An order was passed at the meeting of the common council this evening providing a board of equalization of taxes. It was stated that of 5,461 persons paying a personal and property tax only 749 pay over \$100 taxes.

PARIS, Feb. 8.—It is stated semi-officially that plans for a colonial conference of Germany, France and Great Britain are under consideration. The aim of the conference will be to settle questions concerning the frontier and commercial claims of the government for their possessions in West Africa. It is said delegates from the Liberia Oil Rivers protec-

torate, Niger country, will be invited to attend the conference.

MEMPHIS, Tenn., Feb. 8.—A cyclone swept over the northwestern Mississippi this afternoon. Several people are reported killed.

BATON ROUGE, La., Feb. 8.—A cyclone struck Fort Hudson this morning, demolishing a number of houses, uprooting trees, and leveling fences. On De Lombrac place and Chambers plantation the most damage was done. On the latter, dwellings were unroofed, a gin house destroyed, and several cabins wrecked. One child was killed and four wounded. On the Chambers plantation a number of colored people were injured.

WASHINGTON, Feb. 8.—The Republican Advisory Committee of the Senate held a meeting after adjournment to-day and discussed the proposed procedure on the part of the Republicans when the tariff bill came to be considered. It was stated that if the bill when reported did not provide for a duty on sugar, coal, iron ore, and perhaps collars and cuffs, enough Democratic Senators to be found willing to vote to recommit the bill.

PARIS, Feb. 8.—The Associated Press correspondent has investigated the sensational story cabled to the United States by a news company, which stated that the French Minister of War, Gen. Mercier, had determined to exclude foreign cannon goods from the provisions to be used by the French army. At the war office officials stated that there was absolutely no truth in the story.

WASHINGTON, Feb. 8.—A cable from Colón to-day announced the wreck of the Keenawag on Bonsway reef on the 2nd inst., while en route from Port au Prince to Bluefields, Nicaragua. All the officers and crew were saved.
