We learn that the Bill referring to the Church of England—passed last session of the Local Legislature—has received the assent of the Governor General.

To-day the High Sheriff counted the special votes and declared the result of the recent election. The result is not changed. Mr. Farquharson retains his seat—his majority being increased to twenty.

In the United States there is unquestionably cause for alarm in connection with the colored emigration to the North-West. Such emigration, made after due preparation and with money in the hands of the emigrants, or their friends, might perhaps be ultimately advantageous to many of them. But the haphazard and hurried manner of its beginning gives few promises of good and many assurances of evil. Considerable money is being raised in Washington and in the North for the guidance and relief of the emigrants, and much suffering will perhaps be prevented; but all well disposed men should unite to check the rash of emigrants until plans are matured to them.

At the Stipendiary Magistrate's Court this forenoon, James McIntyre appeared on a charge of picking pockets. Officer McGregor alleged he had information on Saturday night that a person was picking pockets on Grafton Street. He went into Mr. Knight's gang way to watch. NEWS BY TELEGRAPH.

Ottawa and Foreign News.

CONSTANTINOPLE, April 19.

It is reported that the inhabitants of Nove Bazar intend to resist the installation of Austrian garrisons.

Russia has revived the mixed occupation scheme by a proposal that Alick Pasha and an International Commission should be empowered to call in a mixed force in the event of disturbances. The acquiescence of the Powers is doubtful.

Mr. Layard, the British Ambassador to Turkey, replying to a deputation, said he was of the same opinion as Salisbury and Beaconsfield, that the line of the Balkans as fixed by the Berlin Congress, should be maintained. He therefore hoped Russia would finally consent to its occupation by the Turks.

LONDON, April 19.

The result of the balloting by the striking Durham colliers will unquestionably show a large majority in favor of continuing the strike.

LONDON, April 19.

One hundred and twenty Germans and Alsacians have left Havre for America. A considerable exodus is proceeding around Basle, especially of peasants and laborers.

OTTAWA, April 19.

The Governor General has received a letter from a number of former tenants of the Duke of Argyle in Scotland, who have emigrated to the State of Illinois, congratulating his Excellency on his appointment in Canada and inviting him to visit their settlement. Lord Lorne has replied that his duties here will prevent him from complying with their request at an early day.

The Insolvency Committee met this forenoon and agreed to present a bill that had been prepared by Messrs. Abbott and Girouard to the House of Commons.

Letter from C. A. Hyndman, Esq.

To the Editor of the Examiner.

SIR,—I have not attended any of the meetings in favor of the Scott Act; but in reading over the speeches made at the Market Hall, on Wednesday, the 17th inst., the Rev. Mr. Hodgson is reported to have said:—

"The law made provision that no liquors were to be sold on the Lord's Day; but it had failed to a great extent there. Were there not also stores with a back office where they sold liquors by retail? and even on days when taverns are closed, could not intoxicating drinks be procured at some of the Breweries?"

Now, Mr. Editor, there are but two Breweries at work in this Island, and being part owner and manager of one of them (the Brighton Brewery), taking my authority from the Dominion of Canada, out of fairness to myself I am bound to state that the insinuation made by the Rev. Mr. Hodgson is utterly false as far as my establishment is concerned. I make this statement, not that I fear the passing of the Scott Act, but rather to rebut an insinuation which, if allowed to go uncontradicted, might do me far more injury.
