CAUCHON IS MINISTER OF THE INTERIOR. His crime is rank and smells to Heaven. Toronto Globe.

GOVERNOR LAIRD left Ottawa for Fort Polley, on the 17th inst.

ST. CHARLES CHURCH, Summerside, was dedicated on Wednesday last.

EDWARD STOKES the murderer of Flisko was liberated from prison on the 21st inst.

BURGLARY.—A burglar entered the store of HOB. D. GORDON, Georgetown, on Monday night last.

MR. MOLYNEUX ST. JOHN, of the Toronto Globe, has been appointed Sheriff of the North-West Territories.

SNOW.—Two feet of snow fell in Quebec and the northern part of New Brunswick in the early part of last week.

MARINE EXAMINATION.—At a recent meeting of the Marine Board at Halifax, Mr. David May, of Charlottetown, passed as Master.

ST. JOHN AQUATES.—Wallace Ross beat Alex. Bralley in the recent contest. Bralley, it will be remembered, was second best in the Centennial races.

THE CONTEST.—The date of the coming contest in Queen's County is not yet known. It is whispered that the election will take place late in November.

REWARD HUNT, Esq., on Tuesday evening last, was thrown out of his carriage by the horse starting suddenly before he took his seat. He received one or two severe cuts about the face. Summerside Journal.

LECTURE.—On Thursday evening last, Mr. O. D. Westmore, of St. John, delivered, in the Y. C. A. Hall, an eloquent lecture on 'the political aspects of the day.' The lecture was delivered under the auspices of the Acadia Provident Association.

CHANGES IN THE CABINET.—A Montreal despatch says: 'A rumor is current in the city, but not confirmed, to the effect that Hon. Mr. Geoffrin will resign the ministry of the Inland Revenue almost immediately, to be replaced by Hon. Mr. Laframboise, also, that one of the Nova Scotia members of Cabinet is on the eve of retirement.'

DIFFERENTLY ADVISED.—The Patriot of Saturday says the report that Mr. Cauchon has been appointed Minister of the Interior, is not true. The Halifax Morning Chronicle of the same date says it is true. The Chronicle confirms the report that Mr. Mills has been appointed President of the Council in the place of Mr. Cauchon.

GOLD.—We have been credibly informed that gold has been discovered near Big Harbor in the County of Victoria. It is not found as gold generally exists in the gold fields of Nova Scotia proper, but is found embedded in slate in very thin layers, and in visible specks mingling with the slate, as found in gold fields recently discovered in Nevada. The information was given a friend of ours by a Mr. Knardick, merchant, of Halifax. C. B. Advocate.

THE VACANT SEAT.—It is said that Mr. Alfred Jones, M. P. for Halifax is to succeed Mr. Laird in the Cabinet, and that Mr. Power, his fellow member for Halifax, will be raised to the Senate, so that Mr. Jones, should he get the portfolio, will return to his constituents in company with a new aspirant. The latest news, however, is to the effect that Mr. David Mills, M. P., is to be President of the Council, and Mr. Cauchon, [of Beauport Asylum notoriety]—Minister of the Interior.

MR. LAIRD AND THE ISLAND.—Says the Charlottetown Patriot, a paper that was the property of Hon. David Laird up to the time he left the Island for good:

"We have reason to know that Mr. Laird accepted the position of Governor of the North West with reluctance, and that he parts from his friends on the Island, both personal and political, with regret. That they had not an earlier intimation of what was about to take place, is no fault of his, for it was uncertain whether he could accept the Governorship which was pressed upon him when he left the Island three weeks ago."

It will appear, then, from this intimation that Mr. Laird actually abandoned his constituency, his Island colleagues in Parliament and his supporters everywhere, without consultation with them, without asking their advice, without the slightest reference to the effect of his conduct on his Party, and without ever bidding them good bye—and this after he had only seen three sessions of Parliamentary life!—St. John Watchman.

WAS IT NECESSARY?—It is estimated that the new Government of the North-West of which Mr. David Laird has just been appointed Lieut. Governor, will cost the country \$457,500 annually, beside \$71,500, the cost of organizing the Government. The cost hitherto while under the Governorship of Manitoba, has been about \$2,000,000 a year. Now it will be as follows:

WAR TELEGRAMS.

STARTLING NEWS. TO ARM! TO ARM!

LONDON, Oct. 18.—Russia considers it to be her duty to immediately occupy Roumania and Bulgaria.

A telegram from Paris states that all the Russians in France have been ordered to proceed home at once.

England considers her diplomacy ended. Austria announces her determination to side with Prussia and Russia.

A call of seven per cent. has been made on Russian securities—making a twenty per cent within one week.

War may now be considered as begun already.

LONDON, Oct. 19.—A meeting of the Cabinet was called to-day.

It is understood the Government will call an autumnal session of Parliament.

The Times says: "It is stated that orders have been given by the War Office to the Commander-in-Chief to hold three army corps in readiness for immediate despatch to the Mediterranean; also that plans for the defence of Constantinople have been forwarded to the Admiral commanding the British fleet in Besika Bay."

Lord Napier has been ordered to hold himself in readiness to take command of the troops that may be sent to Egypt.

The Times states that there is nothing but what is ordinary and necessary in calling the Cabinet together at such an emergency. It will be only common sense to await the result in deliberations before giving credence to less authentic statements. Neither Parliament nor country would ever hear of going to war in behalf of Turkey. She had her opportunities and has thrown them away. It would be criminal folly to expend the smallest amount of English blood or treasure in her support.

The Times' Paris correspondent says: "Symptoms of accord between Russia and Germany become more apparent daily. Austria placed between her formidable neighbors must ultimately obey them. The only thing that keeps Russia back is Austria's neutrality is not enough for her. She wants Austria's co-operation. France and England are the only powers that sincerely desire peace."

LONDON, Oct. 19, p. m.—The Stock Exchange opened free from the panicky feeling of yesterday, and most stocks slightly firmer.

It is reported that the British fleet rendezvousing at Halifax has been ordered to remain there until further orders, and not go into winter cruising grounds at the West Indies.

Lloyd's has been notified to have ships ready for transporting troops.

This morning's Financialer says a war risk of five shillings per cent. was required yesterday for Lloyd's and various Insurance Companies on British vessels trading between England and Australia and the East.

Her Majesty's troop ship Junna left Port's mouth yesterday for India with 944 artillery men and upwards of seventy officers, sergeants, &c. She will embark another battery of artillery at Plymouth.

LONDON, Oct. 20.—A Times special from Belgrade makes the important announcement that two thousand Russians have crossed the Pruth.

The London journals editorially seem inclined to abandon all hope of preservation of peace between Russia and Turkey.

The policy decided upon by the Cabinet yesterday, to abstain from the quarrel for the present, meets the support of the people and the press.

A despatch from Constantinople says General Tojantief, the Russian Ambassador will, to-day present his credentials to the Sultan.

It is believed that negotiations are about to be re-opened between the Porte and the Ambassador of the Powers on the basis of the English proposals.

LONDON, Oct. 20.—The Queen will hold a Council next Monday.

The Cabinet met yesterday; all the ministers were present.

The Times says: "The ministers met only to confirm by common accord conclusions at which the country had arrived. If the result be only negative as far as present action is concerned, this only represents the almost unanimous desire of the country. There is to be no ultimatum or contingent declaration of war. There will, moreover, be no autumn session of Parliament. The Cabinet did nothing which can justify the prevailing fears of British participation in war."

DIED. At Vernon River, on the 19th inst., William, eldest son of Joseph and Ann Storey, aged 33 years.

MEMORANDA. MONDAY'S STORM.—One of the most disastrous gales, the like of which is seldom witnessed on this Island, sprang up on Sunday night last, about eleven o'clock, and it continued up to Tuesday morning, when it moderated considerably. The wind blew from the south-west. The shipping in the harbor suffered severely from its effects. The schooner, belonging to W. Strong, Esq., anchored some distance from the Railway Wharf, broke clear and was driven against the west side of the wharf, where she became a total wreck. The Leader, owned by John Young, collided with one or two other vessels, and became dismasted, had her bulkheads stove in, and was considerably damaged by striking against the wharf where she lay driven by the wind. The Onward, Capt. Ellis Kennedy, was run into by the schooner and had her main boom and figure-head carried away. She was also chafed badly— a new vessel—and the Eliza A., of N. S., were chafed through in two places, by rubbing against the pier. The Eleanor, broke clear from her anchorage and lost one of her masts. The brigantine, the Willie and the Evening Breeze, and another vessel lying at the east side of the wharf escaped without injury. The schooner, Adelaide, from Quebec, loaded with fish and fish oil, put in here on Sunday night, and ran on the wharf where she became waterlogged and sunk. The brigantine Zulicha, lying at Holman's wharf, after receiving some slight injuries, was let clear of her moorings and anchored in a stream where she safely rode out the storm. The schooner, Arroyo lying in the stream had her stern stove in by the Leader running foul of her. The other vessels lying at the east side of the wharf escaped the fury of the storm. Throughout the town many traces of the violence of the wind are to be seen. Several buildings with unsafe foundations, and not properly up to keep them from toppling down. A new barn being built by Mr. Rogers, of the Linkley Road, near the residence of Mr. Finlay McNeill, was blown down in a completely wrecked condition, and the roof completely blown away, and the structure in many places, and cross stripped of their branches and in some cases torn out by the roots.—Journal.

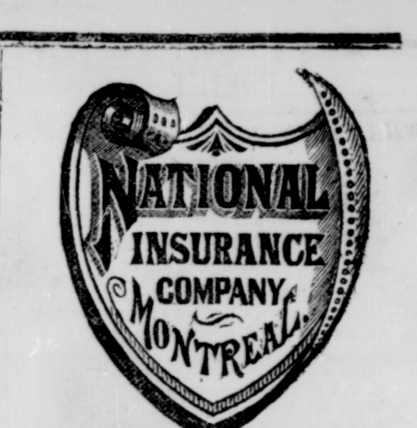
